The C.P.R. will discontinue its daily mail delivery to Claremont as of Monday, April 25th. Since the village is not located on either No. 7 or No. 47 highways, no deliveries will be made from Toronto by truck. It will be picked up in Stouffville by car and taken to the Claremont post office where it will be sorted. There will be two pick-ups daily, at 10:20 a.m. and 6:15 p.m.

Due to the 6:15 deadline, Claremont Postmaster, Mr. Fred Morley has requested that all out-going mail should be delivered to his office not later than 5:30 p.m. Mr. Morley told the Tribune that road conditions between Stouffville and Claremont could cause local couriers some trouble, especially during the winter season.

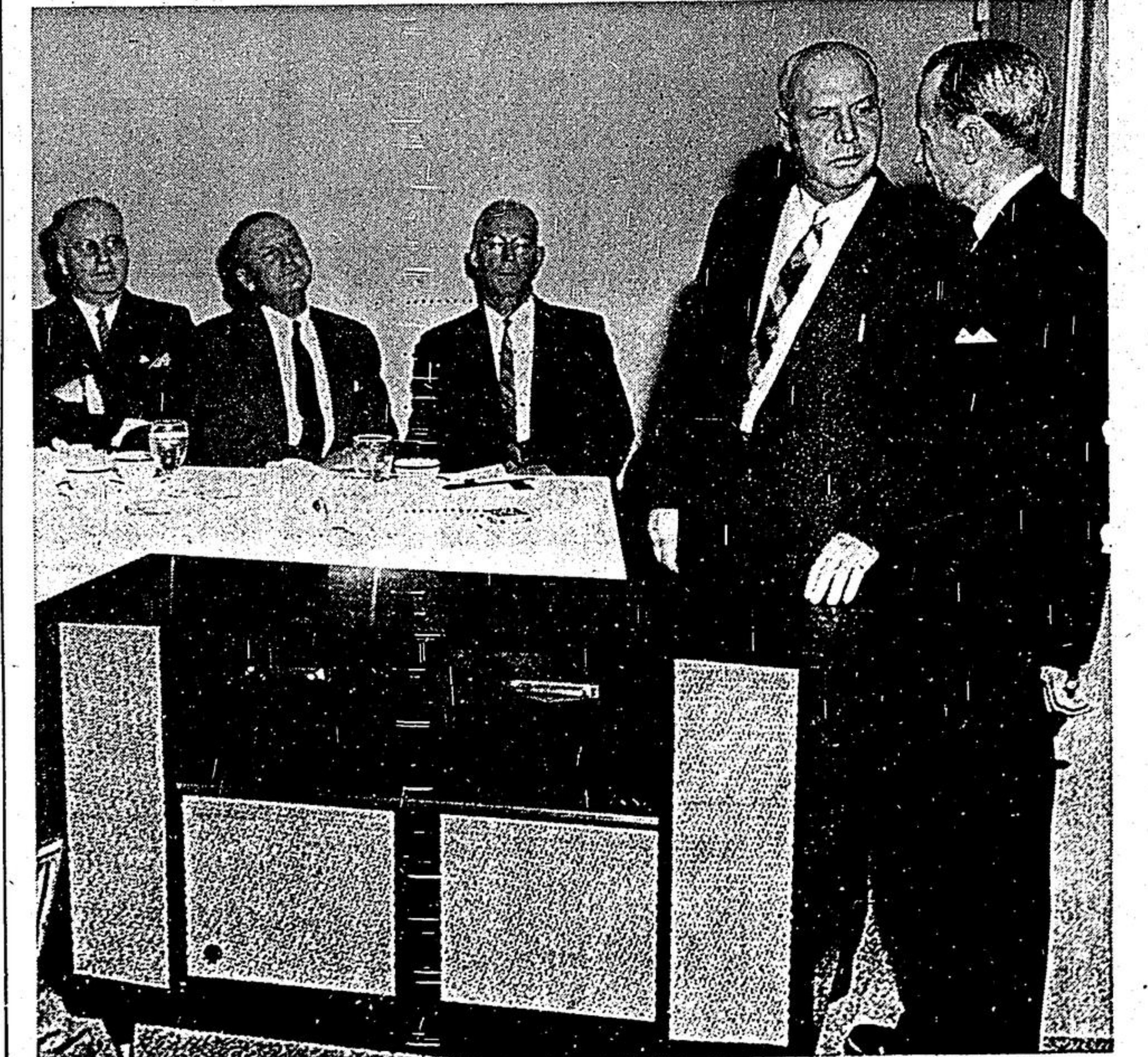
ORFEDA and the Show; and the office, now in Willowdale, enjoys a very cordial relationship with Manufacturers, Distributors and Dealers alike.
