Mrs. Greer Sr. who spent the winter with her son and family in Colorado is visiting with Mr. and Mrs. David Greer and family.

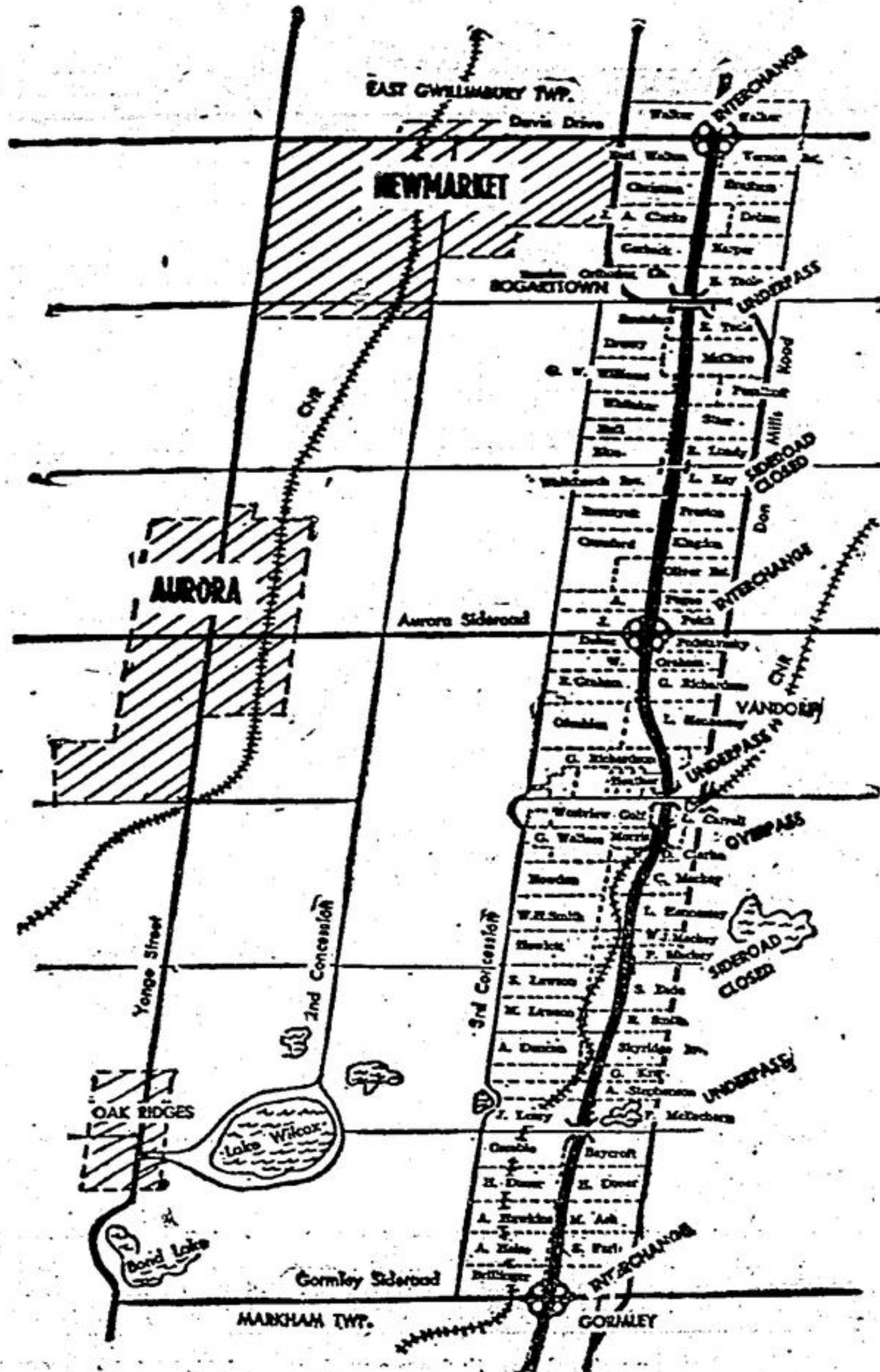
Mr. David Greer who has been ill for some time, entered the York County Memorial Hospital on Saturday where he is presently under observation. We hope he will soon be permitted to return home.

Plans Are Out For New Highway

This map prepared by the Aurora Banner, shows the route of the proposed Don Mills Parkway extension as it runs through Whitechurch Township. The new super highway will run just ten miles west of Stouffville. It will have an inter-

change with the Markham-Whitchurch townline, at Gormley. It will cut through many familiar farms in Whitechurch, including that of Reeve George Richardson. The cloverleaf interchanges

along the route will each involve about fifty acres. There will be one at Gormley, the Aurora sideroad and Newmarket. The first one south of the townline will be at No. 7 highway.

New Rate Schedule For Cottages Is Announced

Summer cottage customers served by Ontario Hydro will receive notice this week of a new rate schedule to apply in 1960.

In announcing the new schedule, Hydro Chairman James S. Duncan said that all summer cottage customers will be billed \$22.22 this month for the annual fixed charge for both two- and three-wire services. For the two-thirds of summer cottage customers who have three-wire service, this amount is unchanged from previous years, but represents an increase of \$5 for customers with two-wire service.

By taking advantage of the prompt payment discount, the service charge can be reduced to \$20.

Accounts for kilowatt-hours used by both two- and three-wire service, customers will be based on the following rates: 4.5 cents a kilowatt-hour for the next block of 675 kilowatt-hours, and 1.5 cents a kilowatt-hour for all additional electricity used. Under the new schedule, a minimum consumption charge of \$22.22 will apply, subject to the 10 percent prompt payment discount.

Thus with the fixed service charge, and the new minimum consumption charge, all summer cottage customers will pay an annual minimum of \$44.44, which can be reduced to \$40 by applying the discount. This represents no increase in the cost of electricity for summer cottage customers with three-wire services who use more than 690 kilowatt-hours a year.

Mr. Duncan said the changes — first since 1953 — were a result of higher costs of providing service to summer cottages. Because these customers have a low kilowatt-hour consumption over a short season, he explained, revenues from summer cottages had been falling far short of the actual cost of providing service.

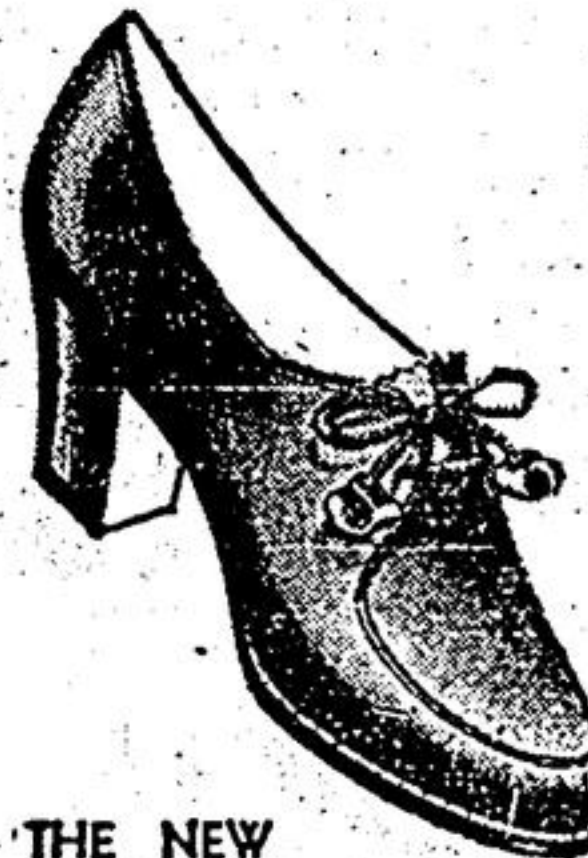
