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
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B. & S. Telephone Co. Holds Final Meeting

Bethesda & Stouffville Telephone Co. held what will be its final shareholders meeting, on Thursday afternoon. The company has recently sold to the Bell Telephone Co. and only final details of the sale wait to be completed. The Bell Co. will take over complete operation of the system in May.

The company presented a most satisfactory statement for the year just ended. Shareholders were advised that revenues over the previous year had risen by 11.7 percent. It was pointed out that operating and general expenses had risen considerably as well, due mainly to general repairs and maintenance.

The company paid a dividend in 1959 of 6% as it has done for many years, and at the same time increased the surplus fund by \$11,718.

While the meeting is expected to be final for the shareholders, it was necessary to elect a Board of Directors and officers for 1960 to carry out comple-
