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hopes to have its conservation areas opened to the public this weekend. However, it all depends on the weatherman's co-operation in drying up the grounds.

"Most of the grounds in the areas are still too soft for satisfactory parking use by the public," says Charles Sauriol, chairman of the conservation areas advisory board. "But if we get some good drying-out weather between now and the weekend, we'll certainly have them opened with all facilities in operation."

The MTRCA supervises six conservation areas throughout the 1,000 square mile region. They are the Albion Hills area just north of Bolton; Heart Lake near Brampton; Glen Haffy in Albion Township near Mono Mills; Black Creek area at Jane and Steeles Avenue, location of the famed Pioneer Village; Greenwood area near Pickering; and the Boyd area near Woodbridge.

Mr. Sauriol noted that the two areas where fishing is available, Glen Haffy and Heart Lake — will open at 8 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday instead of the usual 10 a.m. Glen Haffy boasts speckled trout and Heart Lake is stocked with rainbow trout.

Last year, nearly 700,000 persons visited these areas during the spring, summer and fall seasons.
