### Suggest Procedural Bylaw for Pickering

In an effort to avoid further outbreaks of verbal violence at weekly meetings of Pickering Twp. Council, the members will give some thought to the introduction of a procedural bylaw. The matter was introduced by ward 4 councillor Ross Deakin and discussed briefly at a special meeting on Monday night.

"I understand that almost every municipality has such a by-law except Pickering," stated councillor Deakin. The suggestion was favoured by councillor Clifford Laycox. "To avoid another night like last week, I think we need it," he said.

Councillor Edgar James was not optimistic over the idea. "I think we're getting along fine," he said. Councillor James suggested that the bylaw did not meet with the complete favour of the Reeve. Reeve Scott was not present to take part in the discussion. Clerk L. T. Johnston informed the meeting that a procedural bylaw had been drawn up some three years ago but had never been put into practice.
