other car. His injuries were slight. The total damage has been estimated at \$1,600.

Town To Accept Bids For New Fire Truck

Stouffville Town Council will invite bids from four separate firms on the purchase of a new fire engine. A deadline of June 16th has been set for all bids to be filed with the Clerk.

Reeve Gar Lehman expressed some concern over the make of the truck. The Stouffville engine will be a G.M.C. as selected by the chief and deputy-chief of the brigade. Committee Chairman, councillor Kenneth Laushway stated that this matter had been left in the hands of the firemen. "I don't intend to dictate

to them on what type of truck should be purchased," he said. Councillor Laushway said that officials of the brigade had checked into this matter very carefully.

Councillor Wm. Parsons urged that the entire cost should be kept within the \$15,000 figure.

Industry to Locate on Ballantrae Farm

The Erie Manufacturing Co. of Milwaukee is to locate a plant on the Hood farm at Ballantrae. The president of the company appeared before council on Thursday evening to discuss plans for the building.

The President, Mr. Alerie stated that council would not be disappointed in the final building which he said would be attractive and a credit to the township.

Reeve Richardson said it would be necessary that the owners appear before Planning Board and a resolution was passed agreeing to the erection of the plant and requesting that Planning Board approve the recommendation.

Radar Brings \$164 In Fines

A radar trap operated by P.C. Darrell Dewar, on No. 7 Highway within the limits of Markham Village during the week of May 6th collected a total of \$164 in fines plus court costs. A number of cases were aired in Buttenville before Magistrate Kelly on Friday morning. Keith Greenfield of Leaside and Gordon Abercrombie of Lindsay both stated that the speedometer cables on their autos were broken. They said that the necessary repairs were made after they were stopped by the officer. No penalty was assessed in either case.

The fines ranged from \$9.00 up to \$14.00. Robt. Milroy, conc. 10, Markham and Ralph Masters of Milliken each paid fourteen dollars and costs.

Dog Problems Still Plague Local Council

Members of Stouffville Town Council are still being plagued with complaints from local residents concerning damage caused by roving dogs throughout the village. The matter was discussed briefly at a regular meeting of Council on Thursday night.

Councillor Wm. Parsons informed the members that much of the trouble appeared to be centered in the west end of town. One ratepayer stated that he was continually replacing small trees and shrubs. The resident has threatened to shoot the animals. They were described as roving in packs.

Councillor Wm. Parsons contended that the same dogs were responsible for the continuous flood of complaints. "If they could be picked up, it would solve most of the problem," he said.

Councillor Laushway stated that residents were hesitant about filing complaints for fear of causing unfriendly relations with their neighbours. He suggested that a hired dog-catcher was the only answer "if we want to pay the money".

Recorded Vote OK's Division Of School Area

A recorded vote, something very rare at County Council, approved the separation of the Newmarket-Sutton High School area, at a special meeting on Friday evening. Reeve Jos. Dales of N. Gwillimbury presented the bylaw and made an impressive plea for Sutton to be allowed to go its own way so far as a High School was concerned. With four seats vacant, the vote was 14 in favour and 10 opposed.

It was interesting to note that the reeve and deputy reeve of Whitechurch, Markham and Stouffville each voted on opposite sides.

Deputy-reeve Wagg of Stouffville asked that the vote be deferred until his Consultative Committee had another opportunity to meet. W. Dean, deputy-reeve of Markham stated prior to the vote that if it were successful, the Committee "might as well fold up." He said that the Department of Education had been run by an aging man for some years with the result little progress had been shown and he hoped it would now be revised.

Planning Commissioner To Officially Open New Town Offices Wednesday

The official opening of Stouffville's new municipal offices will be conducted on Wednesday afternoon, June 15th at 2:30 p.m. Mr. Murray V. Jones, Commissioner of Planning for Metropolitan Toronto, will cut the ribbon.

Chairman of the afternoon ceremony will be Reeve Gar Lehman of Stouffville. Rev. D. Davis will offer the dedication prayer and Reeve Lehman will introduce the guests of honour, including Mr. Jones, Mayor A. A. Mackenzie, local member of Parliament, A. T. Butler, Director of Municipal Administration, Warden Wm. Clark of the County of York and a number of former Reeves. A number of council members from neighboring municipalities are expected to attend as well as other town officials.

The residents of Stouffville are specially invited to the Official Opening ceremony and inspection of the new offices. Refreshments will be served.

Stouffville's new municipal offices are located in the former theatre building which was renovated by Mr. Leman, architect, and now presents a most modern and pleasing interior. There

is ample public accommodation on the lower floor as well as spacious facilities, and private offices for both the reeve and clerk. A modern stairway leads to the floor above where is located the Council Chamber, a large Committee Room and small kitchen area.

Both floors have washroom facilities as well as excellent vault and vault storage.

Little more than half of the building has been used, and to the rear of the new offices is a large storage area for the works department and space which can readily provide for future expansion of the offices.

The interior is well-lighted and equipped with tile floors, large public counter, all done in a most modern and pleasing colour scheme.

The changeover to new and larger office accommodation has been a long-felt need in Stouffville and became definitely acute with the steady growth of the town. Thus the move was made last fall to acquire the present building and begin the rebuilding program. Funds for the project were all provided by fees paid into town by sub-division development, and no debentures or tax money was required.

40,000 Gallons of Asphalt Prime For Whitchurch Twp.

K. J. Beamish will supply 40,000 gallons of asphalt prime to Whitchurch Twp. at a price of 25.5 cents per gallon. This was the lowest tender of six received.

Council agreed to purchase a hoist from the Wayne Pump Co. at a price of \$2,033. Installation will be an additional \$300. The hoist is to be installed in the new township garage building and has a capacity of 24,000 pounds.

A contribution of \$1300 will be paid to the Aurora Memorial Fund, being one third of the estimated cost of putting the memorial in good repair. The memorial is located on Yonge St. and an addition is also to be made in order that further names may be added.

Propose County Assume 5 Miles Of 10th Con.

The Special Committee of York County has recommended to the county that it assume five miles of the 10th concession of Markham Township, running from Stouffville south of No. 7 highway. The committee making the recommendation is headed by chairman John Perry, reeve of Vaughan Twp.

The recommendation brought forth cries of "why not a road in our district?" Reeve George Richardson of Whitchurch Twp. suggested that the Bloomington road be added to the list of those to be assumed.

Reeve Richardson asked that the county assume the road from Highway 48 to the 10th concession. He pointed out the heavy truck traffic and said that it took more than its share of road funds to keep it in shape. The matter was passed over to the special committee for consideration.

It is expected that work will start shortly on the completion of the Gormley Rd. to Yonge St. and survey work will begin on the 4th concession or Don Mills Rd. from Victoria Square to Vandorf. The Aurora road from the C.N.R. crossing to the 3rd concession, of Whitchurch will be built this year.

One-year-old Boy Hit by Ball

One year old Brian Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kaye Evans, Pine Grove, was hit on the side of the head by a foul ball during a tournament held at Mt. Albert on Saturday. The little lad was rushed to the York County Hospital at Newmarket where he was retained for two hours. X-rays showed no fractures.

The accident occurred during a softball tournament. The boy's father is a regular player with Mt. Zion. In spite of the blow, the child was not knocked unconscious.

Merlyn Preston Gets Garbage Contract

There were six tenders received by Whitchurch Twp. Council for the collection of garbage at the various lakes in the township. The successful bidder was Merlyn Preston at a total price of \$6,950. This amount is made up as follows: Oak Ridges and Wilcox Lake \$4,550, Preston Lk. \$225, Musselman's Lake \$2,075 and extra collections \$100. The collector is to be charged \$200 for the use of the disposal area just off Highway 48.

Extra Constables for Lakes Two extra constables are to be engaged in Whitchurch Twp. as was done in 1959, to assist in patrolling the two lake areas during June, July and August.

Refuse Claim for Poultry N. Niemeyer whose poultry farm is located on the 4th concession, has made a claim against Whitchurch Twp. in the amount of \$228 for poultry. The

loss was stated to be 448 birds. Mr. Niemeyer claimed that a dog caused 4,000 of his chickens to panic, with the result that this large number was smothered.

The carcasses showed no marks and outside of dog tracks council could not find any evidence to substantiate the claim.

PUC Buys New Access Road To Reservoirs

Stouffville Public Utilities Commission has completed the purchase of a new access road to the town's reservoir property in Whitchurch Twp. Since the old right-of-way over the Ratcliff farm on Baker Hill was subject to the change of the owner, it was decided by the Commission members to cancel the present agreement and purchase a new roadway. The new access is 25 feet wide and was bought from Gordon Ratcliff for the sum of \$1750.

Mr. Ratcliff retains the right to use the roadway to reach the rear fields on his farm, but the right-of-way is the property of the Commission.

The route runs close to the Commercial Sand & Gravel Co. property and an agreement is being completed with this company regarding any use they might make of the road.

No Further Debentures Reeve Lehman asked that the members instruct him as to what word he was to carry to council pertaining to the \$30,000 debenture issue that was proposed earlier in the year. The members agreed that since the \$25,000 was available for the Commission building, if such was erected, there was no further need for more debentures at this time.

New Poles Secretary Elmer Daniels advised the members that a carload of new poles order in conjunction with Markham P.U.C., had arrived from the Rudolph Lumber Company. Stouffville will receive 68 poles of various lengths and they will be stored near the arena pending erection of a permanent rack.

Rev. D. Davis Opens "Cuboree"

Rev. D. Davis officiated at the opening of the third annual "Cuboree" held in Stouffville on Saturday. Ten packs, comprising a total of 3300 boys were in attendance including groups from Newmarket, Aurora, Holland Landing and Stouffville. Individual crests were presented to the Cubs by Mr. Cec Hendricks, Chairman of the Stouffville Public School Board.

It is the first "Cuboree" to be held in Stouffville. The annual meet was conducted in Newmarket last year and in Aurora in 1958. The Cuboree Chief for the day was Mrs. Elizabeth Fletcher of Newmarket. Mr. Fletcher was the Chief Judge. Other officials were — Mrs. Ethel Ogilvie of Newmarket, Leslie Knowles of Newmarket, May Heath of Aurora and Mary Southall of Holland Landings.

Each Cub was required to bring his own lunch. Ice cream, soft drinks and crests were supplied for a fee of 35c.
