**Native of Glasgow Active in Nursing, Died on 83rd Birthday**

Born in Glasgow, Ontario, near Stouffville, Clara M. Widdifield passed away on her eighty-third birthday, April 21st, 1960, at the Doctor's Hospital, Toronto.

In 1908, Miss Widdifield entered her nursing career in Cleveland, Ohio, U.S.A., at the Lakeside Hospital. She nursed overseas from 1917 to 1919.

Upon her return from overseas, she was appointed Second Assistant Principal of Nurses at Lakeside Hospital where she remained until 1921.

Miss Widdifield became the Director of the new Shelbyville General Hospital in the U.S. in 1923, and in 1924 she went to Corry, Pennsylvania to a newly instituted hospital. In 1928, she became First Superintendent of the new Meadville City Hospital. She later went to the Samaritan Hospital in Troy, New York where she was Assistant Superintendent.

In 1936, she nursed in a Hospital for the Mentally Ill and in 1938 she moved to the McGregor Home for the Aged in Cleveland, Ohio.

From 1940 to 1948 she was Superintendent at the Huron Road Hospital in East Cleveland, Ohio, and from there, Miss Widdifield returned to Toronto where she lived for the past twelve years.
