**Giant Pruning Job Completed In York County Vivian Forest**

In his report last week to York County Council, deputy-revee Cliff Wallwork of Whitchurch Twp. advised that during the fall and winter months a giant job of pruning had been completed. A total of 18,519 trees were trimmed up.

A 25 acre red pine plantation, 25 years old, received its first thinning by removing every 3rd row of trees. Cutting was done on a piece-work basis, and 165 cords of pulpwood were produced from the thinnings.

Thirty-five acres of red and white pine which was thinned 10 years ago was thinned for a second time. This operation produced some 20,000 lineal feet of pole material, 50 cords of pulpwood and a number of posts. Most of the poles were sold to the Canada Creosoting Co., and some to Sibbald's Point Provincial Park. All the pulpwood produced is consigned to the Ontario Paper Co. under a 5-year contract. The posts are presently being treated with preservative, and are to be used mainly on the County Forest.

In addition to cultural treatments in plantations, approximately 40 acres of natural hardwood stands were treated. This work was in the form of an improvement cutting in which undesirable trees were removed. The material removed was manufactured into sawlogs, boltwood and fuelwood.

Planting of the new Pefferlaw Creek Tract got underway this spring quite belatedly, due to extreme moisture conditions.

The Committee's operating budget set for 1960 for general purposes and land options was \$2,000,000. No options for purchase of lands for 1960 have been taken up to this date. However, your Committee feels that a parcel of property in Georgina Township should be considered. This property shall be examined at a later date with the idea that if suitable, an option and deposit could be made with the balance of payment being made in 1961.

On Thursday, members of council visited the County Forest, an annual event begun some years ago. Following the inspection the group travelled to Cedar Beach Gardens for a luncheon.

**\$8,000,000 Hospital Plans**

A lengthy report from the York County Hospital Association and the York Central Hospital Association proposed to County Council on Friday night that \$8,000,000 be spent in hospital expansion in the county in the next few years. Most members expressed the view that some expansion program was necessary but they were not prepared for any such amount.

The eight million expenditure proposed would erect a large addition to the Newmarket Hospital as well as build a new hospital at Richmond Hill.

The chairman of the Newmarket-Hospital Board stated that if that hospital was increased to 300 beds, it would attract a high standard in the medical profession.

Warden Clark stated that the proposal would not come to a vote at present. He asked for full discussion and further study.
