Ask That Act be Changed

York County Council last week discovered that it has been illegally paying school taxes for many years to county municipalities on reforested land.

In a report to council from the warden and commissioners, it was learned that the county does not have the authority to pay such taxes on county-owned property held for reforestation nor does it have the power to pay a grant in lieu of taxes.

The municipalities containing county reforestation include the Townships of Whitchurch, East Gwillimbury and Georgina.

Each municipality receives \$1,700 per year in school taxes for this.

It was pointed out by council that if these taxes should cease, an undue burden would be placed on the municipalities concerned.

Council unanimously passed a resolution requesting that the legislature be changed to amend the existing statute known as "The Trees Act" so that the county can legally give grants to municipalities in lieu of taxes.

Two men are in satisfactory condition in York County Hospital after they crashed in a two-seater aircraft in a farmer's field two miles east of Brown Hill on Sunday.

William Gerald Avison, 48, of Princeton rd., Toronto, an instructor with Goodwood Flying School, was practising emergency landings with his student, Kenneth McIntosh, 18, of Clonmore dr., Scarborough, when the engine failed within two miles of two airfields.

Mr. Avison, a former Trans Canada Airlines pilot, had his teeth knocked out and received cuts and possible back injuries.

Mr. McIntosh suffered cuts and shock. Damage to the aircraft was estimated at \$2,000.

In practising crash-landings, the aircraft was to descend toward the ground without actually landing. On one such descent, the engine failed.
