Early Pickering Families Recalled by Speaker

The Barclays, Willsons, Hubbards, and Fullers are well known names in Pickering Twp. Their history is carefully preserved by Robert Fuller, one of the descendants and the special speaker at a meeting of the Pickering Township Historical Society last week. Gravestones in the old cemeteries in the Township bear their name, as do the descendants who reside in the Township today.

Mr. Fuller's father left Brougham at the age of 23, when he first married. He recalled earlier days with reminiscences and anecdotes. Mr. Fuller's father had worked in the fields when men were binding sheaves by hand. He had worked at threshings with horse power to drive a cylinder threshing machine, and the steam engine, later, hauled around by horses.

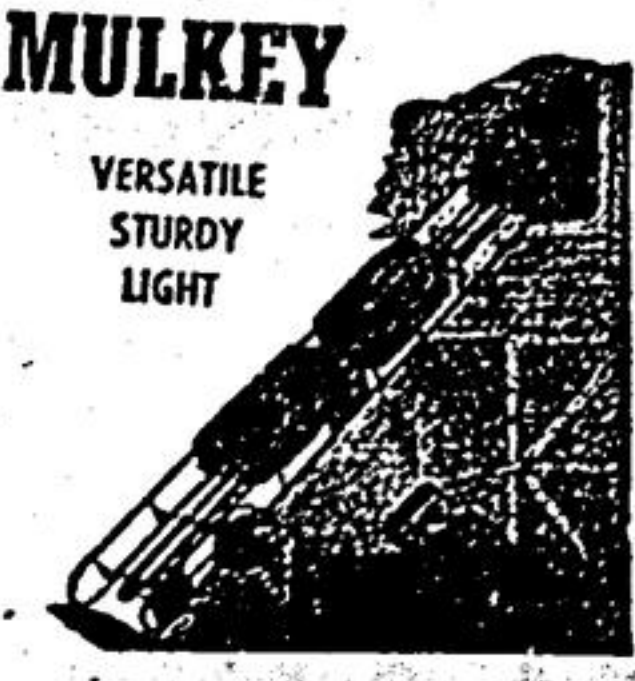
