

Hospital Commission Educates to Overcome Problems

The Ontario Hospital Services Commission has launched a public education program to help insured residents avoid difficulties when they, or their dependants, are admitted to hospital. As could be expected the launching of a program as large as Ont. Hospital Insurance raised a number of problems for both the Commission and the people of Ontario. Most of these were the natural result of the plan being new, and its provisions and requirements not being clearly understood by the people.

In the early months of 1959, the Commission was besieged by avalanches of correspondence and telephone calls for information. It is estimated that during the Spring of 1959 there wasn't a day when there weren't at least 10,000 letters on hand to be answered. However, these early problems have been overcome but a few others remain and these are being energetically dealt with.

Up to Individuals

One of the most usual problems is that some insured people still arrive at the hospital for admission without their hospital insurance certificate, or at least their certificate number to identify them. Others do not take the proper action to keep insured when they get married or leave insured groups. Also

many parents still do not realize that they should arrange for separate premiums to be paid for their children as soon as they reach age 19. These are things that must be taken care of by the insured persons themselves.

Much has been done through the distribution of literature to educate the public on the action they should take in varying circumstances to keep insured, and it is hoped that the current educational program will help speed public understanding of the plan.

The 30,000 insured patients who received the benefits of Ontario Hospital Insurance in every month of 1959 would be enough to completely fill the Canadian National Exhibition grandstand more than 3 times.
