19,000 Mennonites Added in Ten Years

Mennonite church membership has climbed to 84,000 from 65,600 in the past 10 years. This is an average increase of five members a day, reports the Mennonite Yearbook.

The denomination has recorded a widening outreach in the past decade. Mennonite workers are now administering to people in 23 countries as compared to seven countries 10 years ago. There are now five colleges and seminaries, 13 high schools and 153 elementary schools with an enrolment of 7,568 pupils operated by the church.
