Old-timers! who have been patrons over the years, know well what to expect of the Cedar Grove show but newcomers are always surprised and delighted at the beautiful setting. A natural amphitheatre rising from the river bank climbs an acre of hill surrounded by tall, lacy set in the valley against a background of trees and shimmering water and overhead the stars vie with the colourful lights and gay costumes. It is a lovely spot.

There are differences of opinion on whether it is better to sit on the benches near the stage or spread a blanket and view the performers from the hill. No matter what parents prefer, children usually like to see the whirling dancers, jugglers and acrobats in wide-eyed wonder at close range. Whether it is the hill or near the stage, an excellent P.A. system brings the entire performance to every ear and the entertainers are chosen for their versatility at long range.


