

Federation Church Service on July 10

Directors of Ontario County Federation of Agriculture held their regular meeting June 21st at the Lakeview Restaurant at Beaverton.

Mr. Russell Rodd, Uxbridge, outlined plans for the Fourth Annual Church Service which is to be held this year on July 10, at the Foster Memorial Temple, three miles north of Uxbridge. Rev. Clifford Waite of Lion's Head United Church will be the guest preacher and special music will be provided.

The Dairy Princess Contest was announced and the Federation agreed to support it and to present the prizes at the Hol-

stein Twilight Meeting July 26. The Federation of Agriculture has recently requested to advise farmers in four different townships within the County regarding land acquisition. In all cases it is Federation policy to help farmers negotiate for a fair settlement.

Mr. Howard MacMillan, Reeve of Reach Township, has been appointed from Ontario County Council to the directorate of the County Federation of Agriculture.

Having learned that there would be no more rabies reimbursement after July 1st, the following resolution was passed

and has been forwarded to the members of Parliament and the Ontario and Canadian Federation of Agriculture.

"Whereas the farmer is being exposed to rabies infection, over which he has little or no control, and is thereby subject to extreme losses both personal and otherwise, we ask that the rabies compensation from provincial and federal governments be continued."

Goodwood Address and Presentation

The following address was given as a tribute to Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Foskett by the United Church in Goodwood, on the occasion of their moving from Goodwood to take up residence in Stouffville.

Ladies and Gentlemen, We have assembled here tonight to honour one who has lived for nearly half a century in our midst. Many changes have taken place in Goodwood during those years, one of those changes being the shift in the population. There are only two people living in Goodwood who were living in the village fifty years ago.



A short time after Mr. Foskett took up residence in Goodwood he entered into and carried on a successful business career with the people of the community as a blacksmith, and later as a dealer in farm equipment. Mr. and Mrs. Foskett's children were born and raised in Goodwood, and they have made a place for themselves in the community in which they reside.

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Yield: about 7 medium glasses (3 1/2 lbs. relish)

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5 cups prepared fruit (about 1 1/2 qts. ripe sour cherries)

1 box Certo Crystals

First, prepare the fruit. Stem and pit about 1 1/2 quarts fully ripe sour cherries. Chop very fine or grind. Add 1/4 cup vinegar and 1 teaspoon each cinnamon, cloves, and allspice, or any desired combination of spices. Measure 3 cups into a large saucepan.

Then make the relish. Measure sugar and set aside. Add Certo Crystals to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1/2 inch hot paraffin.

Preserving Pointer. Never open a jar after sealing to fill the space which may appear at the top. If the sealer is completely air-tight and has been properly and sufficiently processed, the food will keep perfectly. Breaking the seal and adding more fruit may easily cause spoilage and waste the whole jar.
