The approval of maximum welfare payments continues to be a thorn in the side of members of Uxbridge Township Council. The matter was discussed briefly at a regular meetfare Officer, Mr. Isaac Catherwood stated that the Provincial Department has advised against any cut-backs on welfare relief. Mr. Catherwood only recently returned from the annual Convention in the City of Hamilton.

"I don't agree with them, whether I'm right or wrong," stated Reeve, Earl Dowswell. He pointed out that some residents, with more pride than others, were willing to work all summer to pay last winter's debts. The Reeve noted, however, that he had no complaint against the local officer. "I admire you for doing the job," he

"It's not what we're paying but what we're encouraging," commented councillor Charles Forsyth.

"It's a peculiar thing that the Dept. of Welfare has the right to spend all kinds of money while other Provincial departments are cutting back on expenditures," said Dep. Reeve Robt. Nesbitt. "There's something wrong somewhere," he concluded.
