The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, looked beautiful in a waltz length princess style gown of white lace over peau-de-soie, and carried a nosegay bouquet of sweetheart roses and carnations, her fingertip length veil was of tulle illusion with alencon lace. She was attended by matron-of-honour Mrs. Ellen Wood and bridesmaid Miss Diane Brown, both of whom wore sheath dresses of sapphire blue shantung with net overskirts of the same colour. Tiny net and velvet caps to match, together with nosegay bouquets of carnations centred by a single sweetheart rose were their accessories.

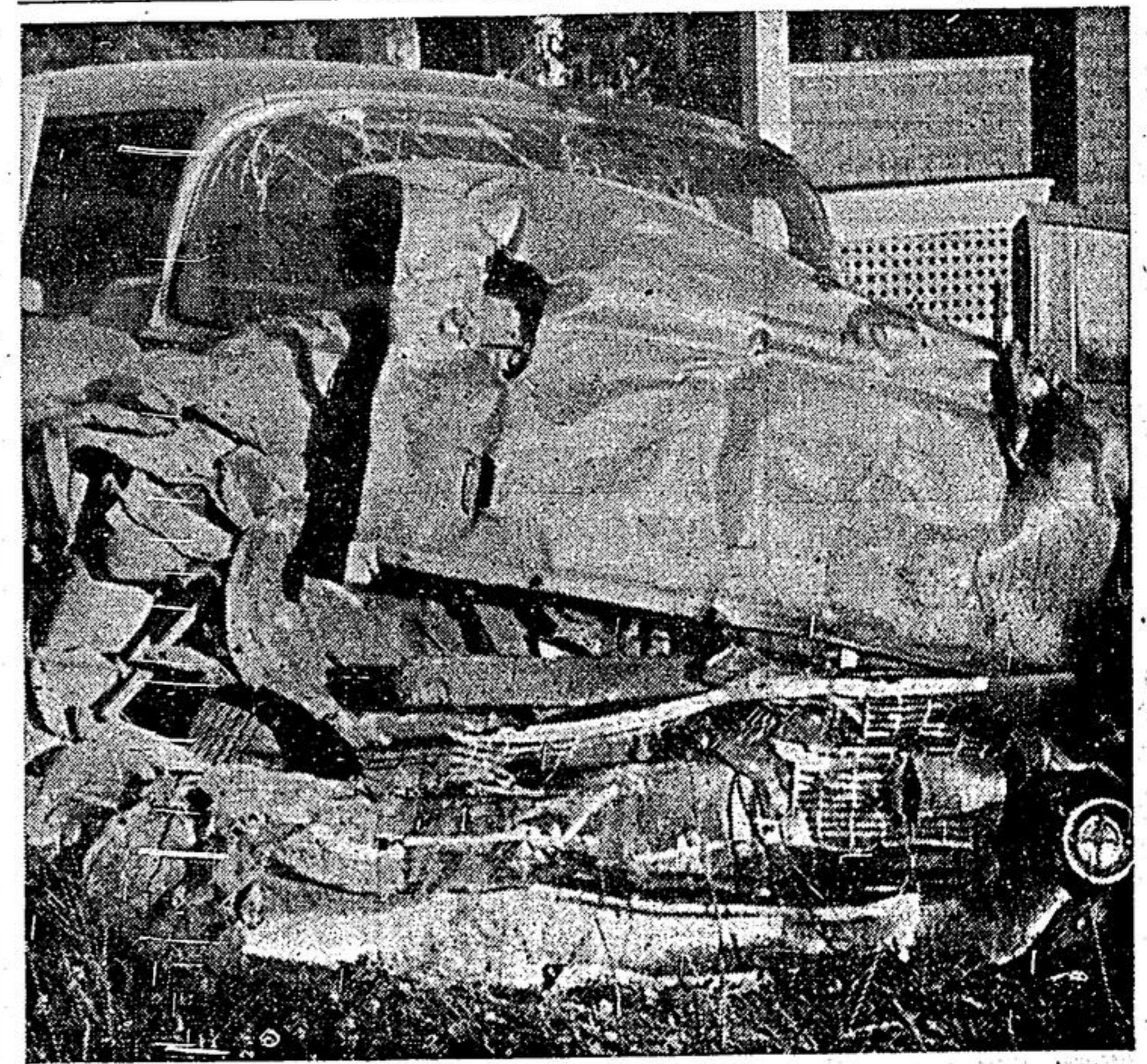
ENGAGEMENTS

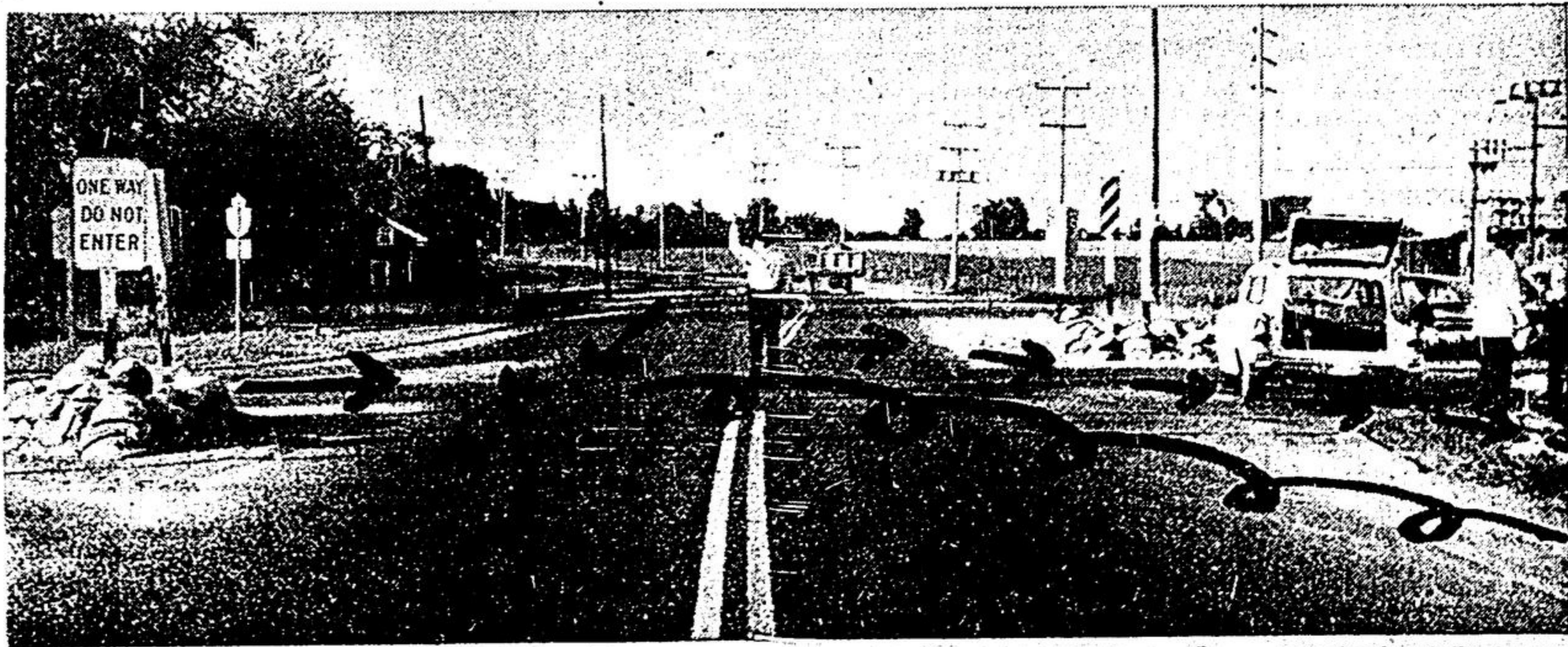
