Homer Schwindt does not carry a "big" herd on his 200 acres near Elmira, Ont., but he ships a lot of milk. His R.O.P. records for the 1958-59 year show that 22 milkers, all ages, averaged 14,002 lbs. milk and 502 fat in 305 days. Compared with Breed Class Average, this works out at 134 for milk, 131 for fat.

"Our two-year-old records have never been so good," says Mr. Schwindt. "Some heifers have hit over 17,000 lbs. in their first lactation." And all his records are made on 2X.

These big, well developed heifers are built to "take it", but a glance at the snapshot above will show that they are sharp, clean-cut, dairy-like. They were grown for size, early breeding, early calving, but not coarsened in the process.

Obviously, Mr. Schwindt is a good breeder and a good feeder. For 12 years he has based his feeding on the Purina Programme. ROSE BED CLEAN-UP

If your rose beds look untidy, give them a summer clean-up, advise horticulturists with the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture.

First, remove all the old flower heads and clean up fallen leaves.

Give roses some soluble nitrogen fertilizer (19-10-10) if they need it. Application of nitrogen

to plants with dark green leaves and a general healthy appearance may do more harm than good; you'll get more leaves, but fewer flowers.

With climbers, prune the old flowering wood and replace it with young growths tied in from the base, says O.A.C. Horticulturist J. C. Taylor. This should be done in August or September.

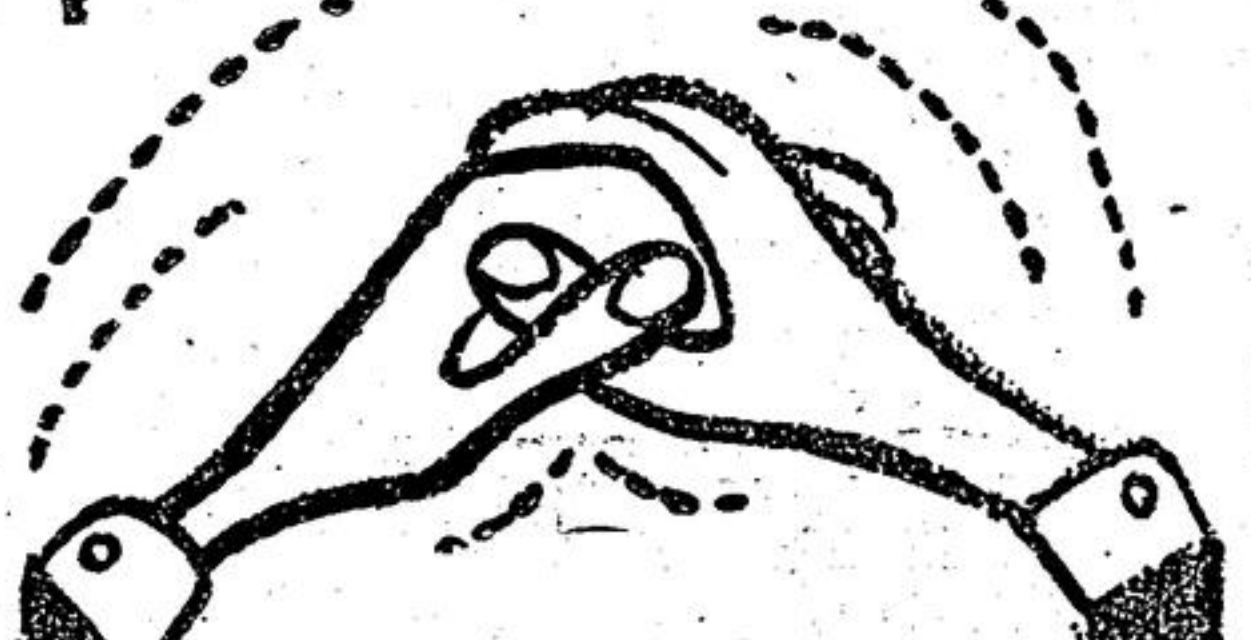
