Hunter Safety Course Starts in Whitchurch

The first hunter safety courses are now being organized by Whitchurch Conservation Club. It is now mandatory under Ontario law that each new hunter take a course in hunter safety training before a hunting license of any sort may be issued. The Conservation Club is sponsoring the training in this area, with plans to hold the courses at Vandorf as soon as there is sufficient enrolment. Courses are open to anyone 15 years and over. It will include firearms, identification and mechanics; safe hunting practices; game laws and regulations; game bird and animal identification; courtesy and sportsmanship; marksmanship under supervision. Three training classes will be held, and a written test given. A certificate will then be awarded to those successful, and this certificate must be presented when an application is made for a hunting license. Applications are available from Hal Botham and Jack Crawford at Vandorf, and from Gordon Duckworth, third concession, Whitechurch.
