Under consideration will be how far apart service centres should be, whether franchises should be given individually or in a block to one company, and how to safeguard the interests of the consumer when service station operators may have a virtual monopoly of supplies.

Completion of two 100-mile stretches of Highway 401—one between Milton and Port Hope, the other paralleling the St. Lawrence, had made the construction of service stations an urgent matter, Mr. Cass said.

Several large catering and oil companies, both Canadian and foreign-controlled were understood to be interested in locating on Highway 401.

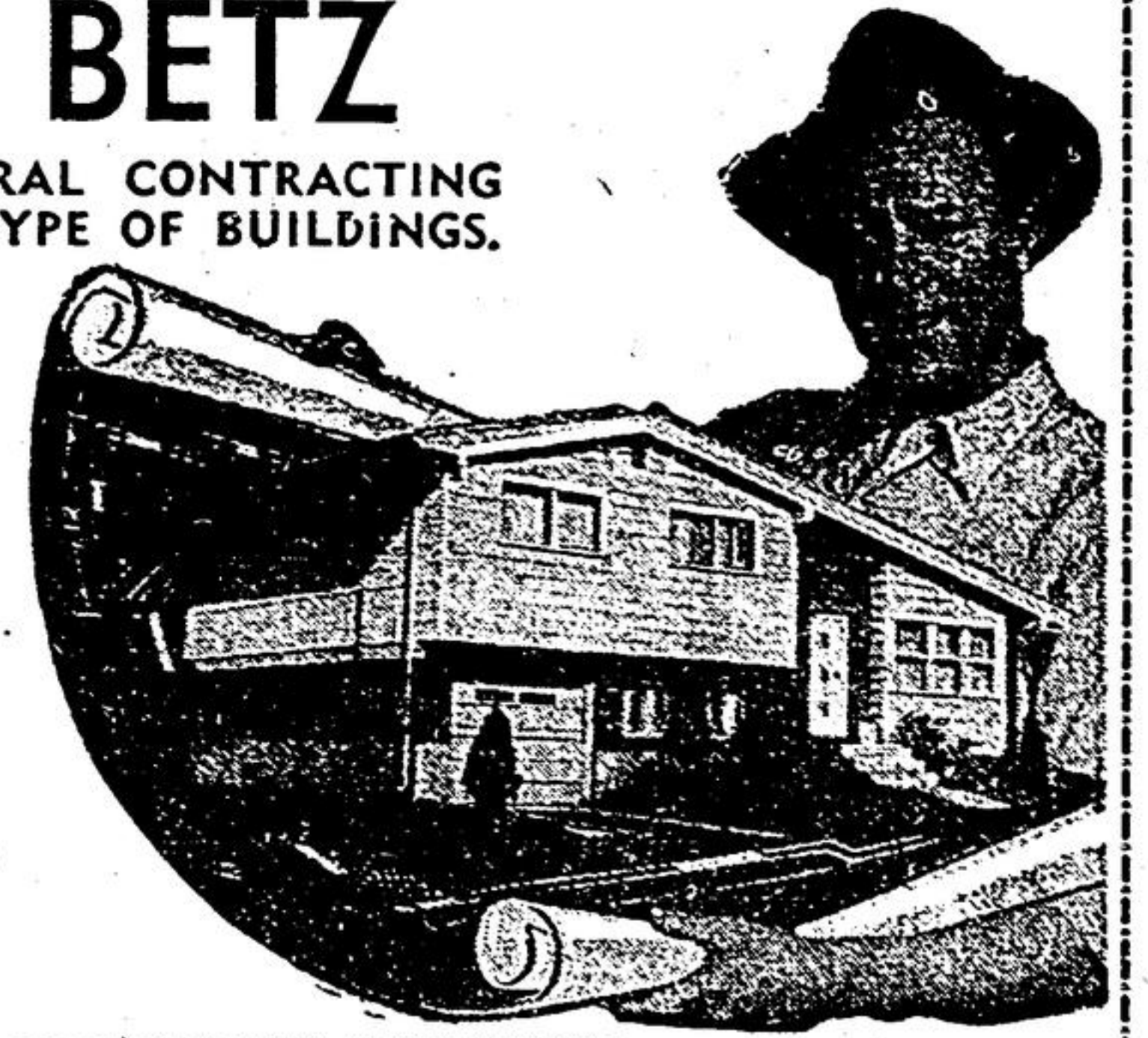

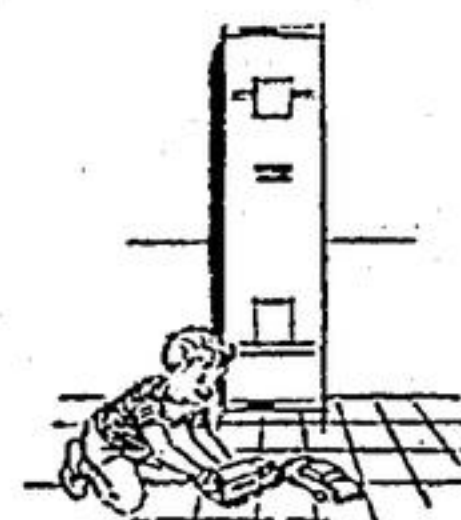

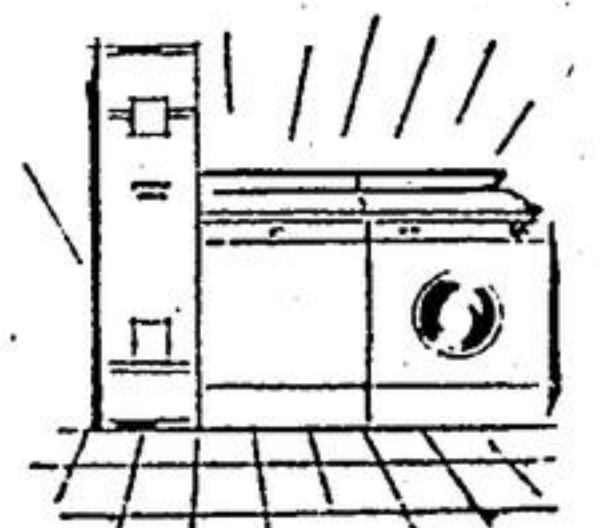
