A 13-year old Ajax boy last week, achieved what is, to most golfers just a dream, a hole-in-one, at the Pickering Golf Course.

Alan Claringbold, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Claringbold, of 78 Bing's Cres., playing his second game of golf, scored his ace using a no. 7 iron and a battered ball he kept for using over water hazards. He had purchased the club for \$1.50.

The 12th hole was the scene. It is a 110-yard hole, par three, down hill and crossing a creek in front of the green. Alan's name will be inscribed on the 'Hole-in-One' plaque in the clubhouse.

Alan says he likes golf. He played his first game about a month ago. To earn pocket mon-

ey to pay for his game he works as a part time helper on an Ajax dairy truck.

The hole-in-one is not his only claim to fame. Alan is a pitcher on the Ajax Lions Bantam baseball team. He has 110 strikeouts to his credit and his pitching has been a major factor in his team's Lakeshore League.

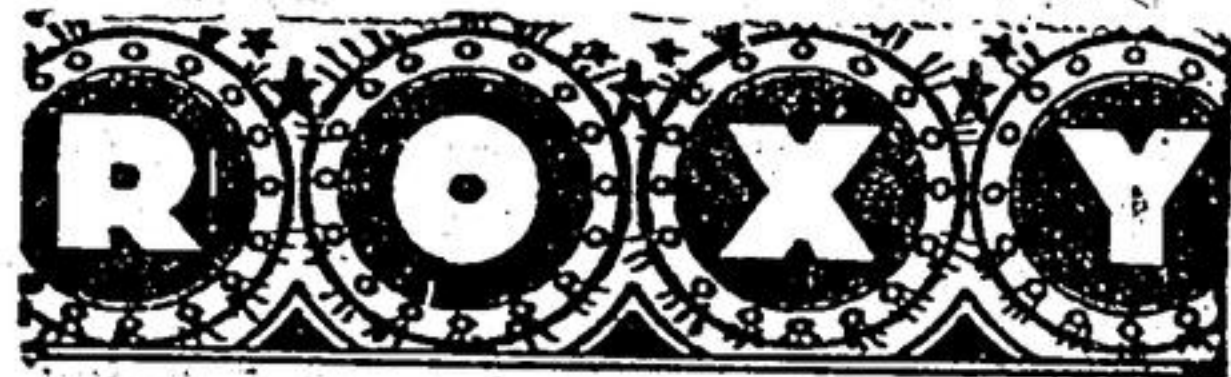

Raglan Makes Bid For Position

In a very well-played and exciting ball game on Monday night, Raglan continued to impress the fans as they staged a thrilling rally in the last inning to upset a highly favored Uxbridge club 7-4.

As early as the third inning, Raglan found itself three runs behind, but they continued to peck away at that total and climaxed their inspired play with a big three-run 7th inning rally which put them ahead for the first time in the game.

For the second consecutive game, Raglan's ace hurler, Bob Talbot, came up with another brilliant pitching performance scattering five safeties, striking out ten and walking only three.

Jim Noble and John Hill combined on the Uxbridge mound to give up eight hits, strike out eight and walk one. Pud Brown continued on his current batting streak, banging out two singles and a double in three trips to the plate to lead Raglan. Marcel Bowin emerged from his batting slump as he clubbed a double and a home run. Murray Birkett in a pinch-hitting role also belted a home run while Bob Talbot with a single and Dennis Cochrane with a double completed the Raglan eight-hit attack.

Brian Kennedy, Ron Noble and Gary Elson each socked a double for Uxbridge while Grant Noble blasted a home run and Bob Ashenhurst a single.

Defensively, Raglan came up with two fine fielding plays. In the sixth, centre fielder Dennis Cochrane made an excellent running catch to rob Bob Ashenhurst of a sure hit while Gary Hayes deprived Bob Risebrough of an important single in the seventh inning by racing far to his right to pick up his drive between third and short-stop.

This was an extremely important win for Raglan as it left them tied with Ballantrae for that sixth and last playoff position.

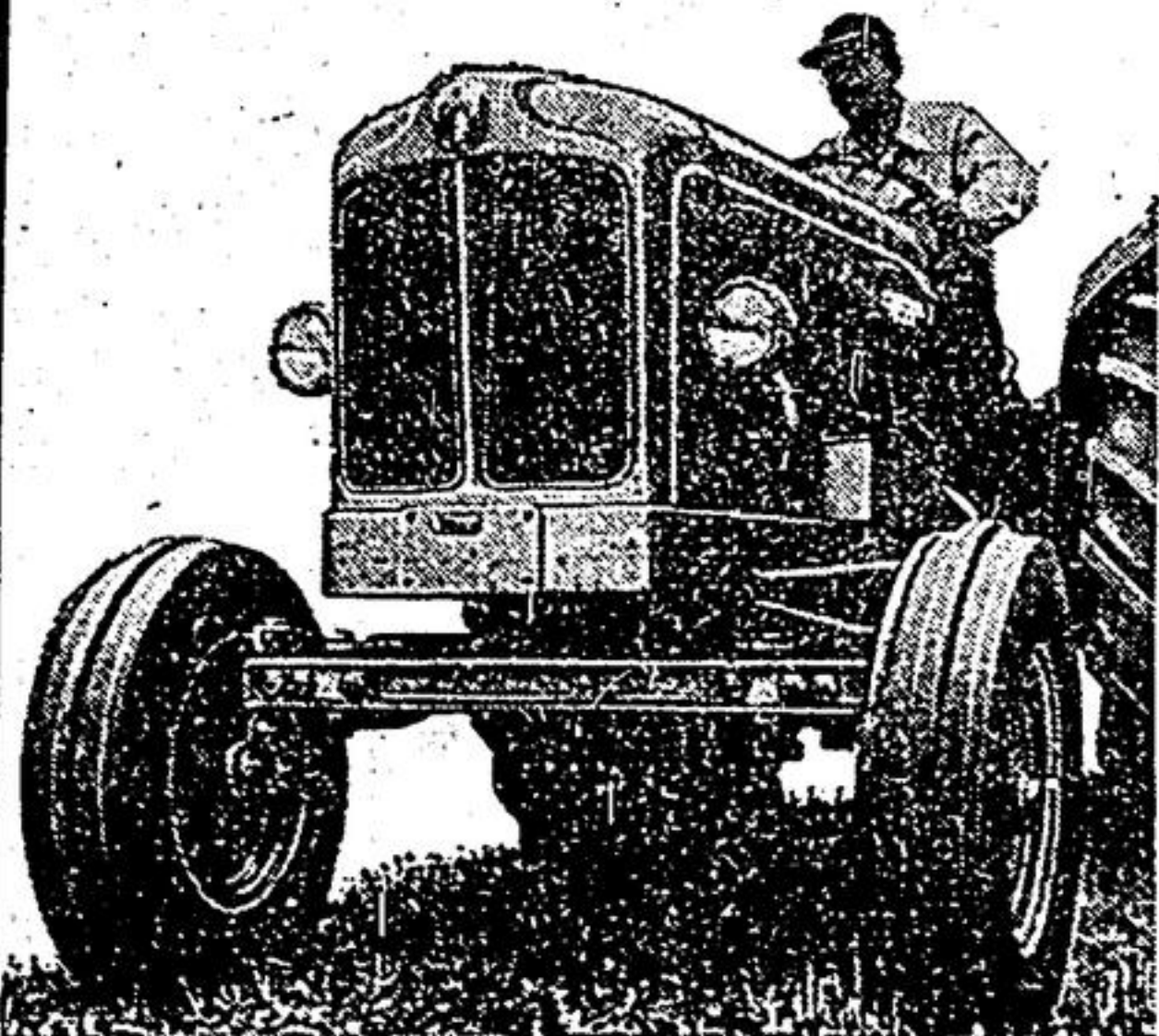
