



## Plan Annexation to Support Population of 7,500 by Year 1980

Stouffville Planning Board and the Municipal Council met on Thursday evening to approve final draft plans of the proposed area which Stouffville will soon be asking to be annexed to town. Zoning will only be prepared on a portion of the new area, leaving a wide buffer zone as farm land within the town boundaries, but controlled by local authorities. Sufficient land is being asked for to support a population of 7,500, the estimated population by 1980.

A capital works program will be necessary over the next 20 years, to provide by 1980, four public schools. The two additional schools which are foreseen within the next 20 years are planned, one in the north-east section of town and one in the northwest. The capital works will also include expanded water pipe lines and increases to the present sewage disposal plant. Much of the financing of public works will be done through contributions of land developers. The exact extent of this program which may be required by the Ontario Municipal Board, will be determined by a special meeting to be held shortly with town authorities and the solicitor.

**1900 Acres**

The proposed area which Stouffville is asking for annexation consists of approximately 1,355 acres of which 510 are in the township of Markham and 845 in the Township of Whitchurch. Approval of the annexation would increase the area of Stouffville from 545 acres to 1,900 acres.

In drafting the plans it has been considered essential that control of land use in the immediate vicinity of the present town boundaries should be exercised by the town. This is believed necessary in order to prevent unsatisfactory development occurring on the fringe of town. Such development can create problems of sanitary works, water supply and school accommodation. Such expansion, it is believed, should be exercised to cover a reasonable period of time, thus the period of 20 years is being used.

**First Expansion North**

Because it is much easier to service land to the north side of the town boundaries, it is proposed that this land should be the first to be developed. Municipal water can be provided much easier as this land is located closer to the source of supply. Sewage disposal is more easily handled through gravity to the plant on the south side.

The industrial areas are to be expanded both on the west side and east side of town. Placing these areas as they are will minimize any friction between residential and industrial uses.

**Park Land**

A green belt area is planned along the length of the creek which runs through the centre of town from north to south, beginning north in the Stouffer property and running down through the park. In addition the meeting on Thursday night moved that a ten-acre parcel including the bush area immediately north of Manitoba St. be maintained as park land.

Mr. Peter Martin of the Metro Planning who attended the meeting in an advisory capacity, said that one of the important features of the Stouffville community was its fine centrally-located park. He said that other municipalities were finding that very small parcels of park land located here and there were hard to maintain. Further, these small parks were not necessary in a community such as this where lots were large, and children had play space on their own premises.

By far the largest category of land zone designated on the proposed plan is agricultural, taking 1,070 acres; residences would occupy 590 acres, industry 138, commercial area 55 acres and park lands 52 acres, making a total of 1,905 acres.

**Hearing in 1961**

While it is the intention to prepare the brief to be submitted to the Municipal Board immediately, due to the vast number of hearings already on the Board's agenda, it is not expected that Stouffville's case will be dealt with for possibly five to six months.

## Markham Police Charge Workman With Assault

A threatened riot at a residential construction site in Markham Township was quelled on Tuesday afternoon after 15 police officers from five separate departments converged on the area. The disturbance occurred at Grandview Heights on the north side of Steele's Avenue. "One" union picketer, Pierre Piersanti of Toronto was charged with common assault and malicious damage.

Three officers from Buttonville, Sgt. Shearn and Constables Dukes and C. Cox were the first on the scene. They summoned the assistance of Markham Village, Vaughan Twp., Richmond Hill and North York. A group of strikers, estimated at over 100 men attempted to free Piersanti from the custody of the police. "They almost pulled him apart," one officer told the Tribune. He was finally placed in a cruiser and retained until the mob dispersed. He is alleged to have thrown a number of bricks through two windows and damaged the wall of one home. He is also accused of striking a non-union man. The police remained in the area for three hours to assure no further outbreaks of violence. It marked the second time within the past two weeks that the Markham Twp. Department has been summoned to the same construction site.

## Buy Drugs at Penitentiary Like Jelly Beans Says Addict

**Admission Shocks Court**

Harry St. Dennis, 37, of no fixed address, an admitted drug addict, was sentenced to three years in the Kingston Penitentiary on Monday on a charge of break and entry into the Markham Village Post Office on July 22nd. He told Magistrate O. S. Hollinrake that he started taking drugs in the Penitentiary and had been using them since his release from Kingston on May 20th.

St. Dennis was picked up by P.C. Darrell Dewar on the Main Street near the post office. He admitted breaking into the building and scattering letters and parcels over the floor. Nothing was stolen. Prior to sentence, St. Dennis asked the Magistrate to send him to the Reformatory rather than the Penitentiary. He said he wished to receive help for his drug addiction.

"If I'm sent to the 'Pen' it will be like going back to the old habit; I'll be right back on the addiction 'kick' again," he said. Acting Crown Attorney, Harold Sanders expressed amazement on hearing that St. Dennis had been able to obtain drugs in the Penitentiary.

"You can purchase dope at the 'Pen' as easily as buying jelly beans," said St. Dennis.

In sentencing the accused, Magistrate Hollinrake said he could not consider the Reformatory request, since his past record showed a list of 31 convictions dating from 1939 to 1960. The Magistrate pointed out that facilities to counter drug addiction were available at the Penitentiary if requested.

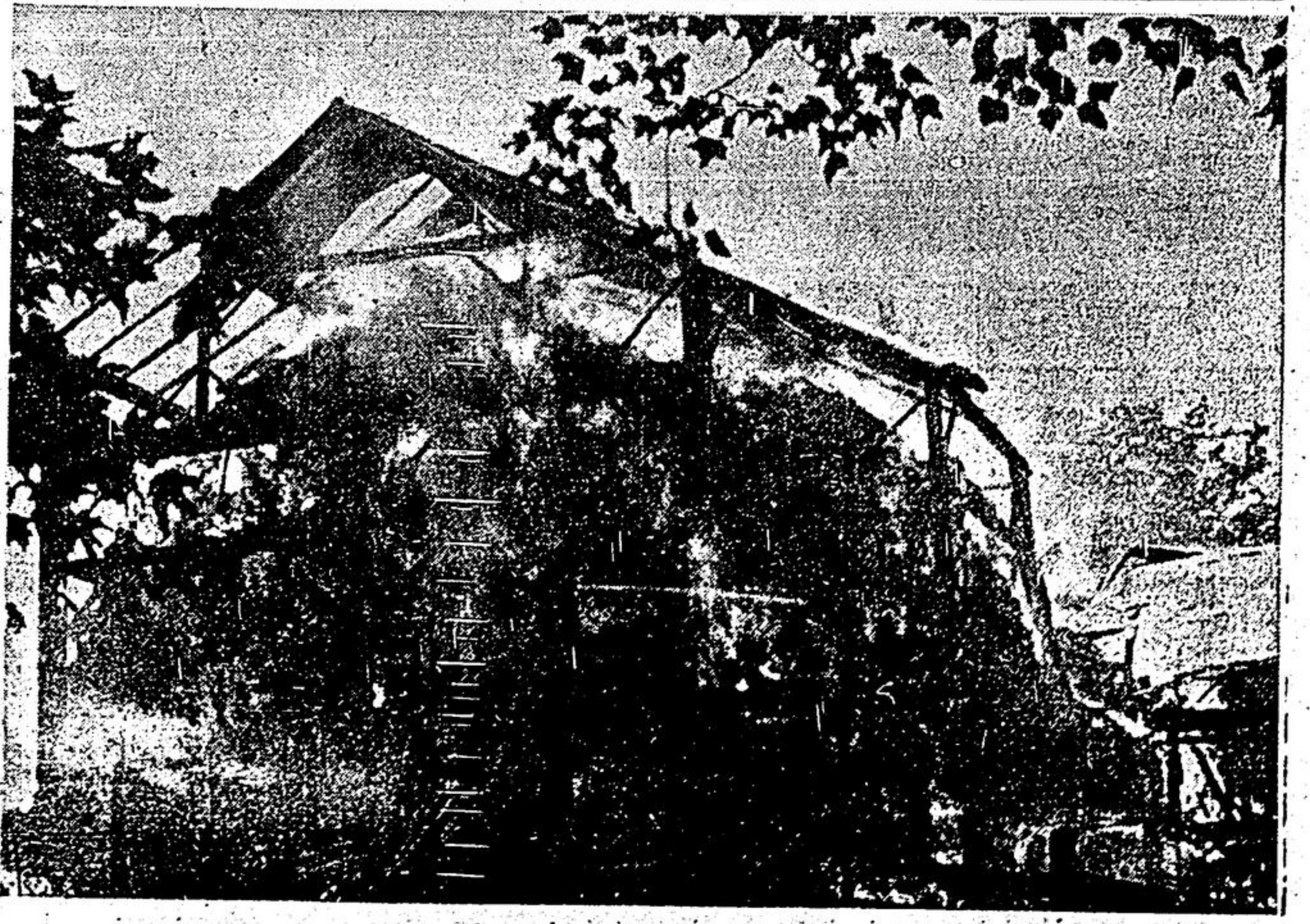
**Cyclist Injured In Rear-end Collision**
