APPLE BUTTER
 Apple butter making will be one of the demonstrations staged at the forthcoming Metropolitan Toronto & Region Conservation Authority's Pioneer Festival at the Pioneer Village Sept. 24. For those who would like to try their hand at making their own apple butter, here is the recipe as used by the Pennsylvania Dutch more than 100 years ago.
 4 qts. of apples
 2 qts. of water
 1 1/2 qts. of elder
 1 1/2 lbs. of sugar
 1 tsp. cinnamon
 1 tsp. allspice
 1 tsp. cloves
 Schmitz (cut into small pieces) apples... cover with water and cook until soft. Bring elder to a boil and add apple pulp and sugar until it thickens. Stir constantly to avoid scorching. Add spices and cook until thick enough to spread. Good apple butter must be boiled long and slow.
