


# Sundwiches

It should provide a third of the day's food requirements, advises the Home Economics Service of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Meat, fish, poultry, cheese, egg or peanut butter can become satisfying filling for sandwiches. Raw fruit or vegetables round out a nutritious lunch and provide an interesting variety. Cake, cookies, doughnuts or ple may be added, depending upon the individual's need for more

In order to pack attractive and healthful lunches, it is necessary to plan menus and shop in advance. Bread can be varied and buns used for sandwiches, too.
