"Aces" Edge Peterboro 1-0 On Blow by Young

Harry Young, a key performer for Markham in regular schedule competition, added another notch to his big bat on Saturday night. He delivered the fatal blow to Peterboro's playoff dreams by belting a line single into centrefield with the bases loaded in the eleventh inning. The drive broke up a scoreless duel between lefty Bob Ellis of the "Aces" and whirlwind righthander, Terry Shaunessey of Peterboro. Another huge crowd witnessed the extra-inning grind. Markham took the series opener, 3-1.

Bases Loaded
As Morley Petch was the hero in the previous round, so Harry Young was the "clutch" batter in Saturday's tilt. A single by pinch-hitter Jim Johnston and two successive errors on routine ground balls poked out by Bob Ellis and Morris Procenko, set the stage for Young's ringing shot to the outfield. Johnston scored easily from third base and the game was over.

Peterboro played well enough to win most contests. On two occasions they loaded up the sacks, but each time the lead runner failed to advance. A sparkling double play by third baseman, Jim Raymer stopped the visitors in their tracks in the first inning. Again in the tenth, they loaded up the bases, but a ground ball was gloved by Morley Petch to cut off the rally.

"Aces" Out-Hit
Markham were out-hit, 9-4. Five Peterboro errors, two of them in the eleventh inning,

spelled their defeat. Shaunessey was working on a brilliant no-hitter until the eighth when Monte Holman tagged him for a Texas League single. Morris Procenko, Harry Young and Jim Johnston touched him for the other safeties. Wayne Haig was Peterboro's best at the bat with three hits, all singles. Buster Jensen and pitcher Shaunessey tapped out a pair. Peterboro left a total of ten men stranded on the base paths.

Issue Protest
The game was played under protest after the base umpire ejected 3rd-sacker, Neil Thompson from the contest in the 7th inning. Thompson voiced objection to a call and tossed the ball in the general direction of the official. The official, in turn, tossed him off the field. It is unlikely that the protest was ever filed with the accompanying fee.

Few Strike-Outs
The Markham batters were hitting the ball but until the eighth inning, each blow was "gobbled up" in an outfielder's glove. They went down in order in the first, second, third, 4th and tenth innings. Al Tidsbury reached first base in the fifth via an error but was marooned on the sack. Morley Petch's drive was bobbled by the pitcher in the 7th, but he too met a similar fate. Shaunessey registered only 5 strike outs. Ellis whiffed 14. Markham will now meet John Edwards and his Hamilton mates in the South Ontario finals. The series opener is in Markham on Saturday night.

Barkey Sparks Dickson's Hill To Y.F.C. Win

First baseman, Don Barkey wielded a big bat for Dickson's Hill on Thursday night and sparked his team to a 19-11 victory over Gormley in the Youth for Christ softball finals. The win evened the series at one game apiece.

The agile infielder belted 3 singles and a home run. He personally counted four runs and drove in one other. His circuit blow came with the sacks empty.

Carl Timbers literally broke up the contest. With the sacks loaded, he slammed a round-tripper to score four runs. In addition, he out-legged a bunt single in the sixth. Dave Barkey bagged a three-run homer in the sixth. Abe Stouffer connected for a 4-bagger in the first.

It appeared in the opening inning that Gormley were headed for their second straight victory. A bunt single by lead-off batsman, Dave Taylor, an error on Murray Emmerson's ground ball and four successive walks counted four tallies. Allan Stouffer took over from starter, Carl Timbers and limited the opposition to seven hits. He yielded two extra-base clouts to Murray Emmerson and Larfy

Johnson—both home runs. The remainder were all singles.

Dickson's Hill clipped the combination of Jim Noble and Paul Spenceley for 12 hits. A solid defensive performance aided the winners. They committed only one error. Gormley had 4 bobbles, two of these coming in Dickson Hill's big 9-run, 6th inning.

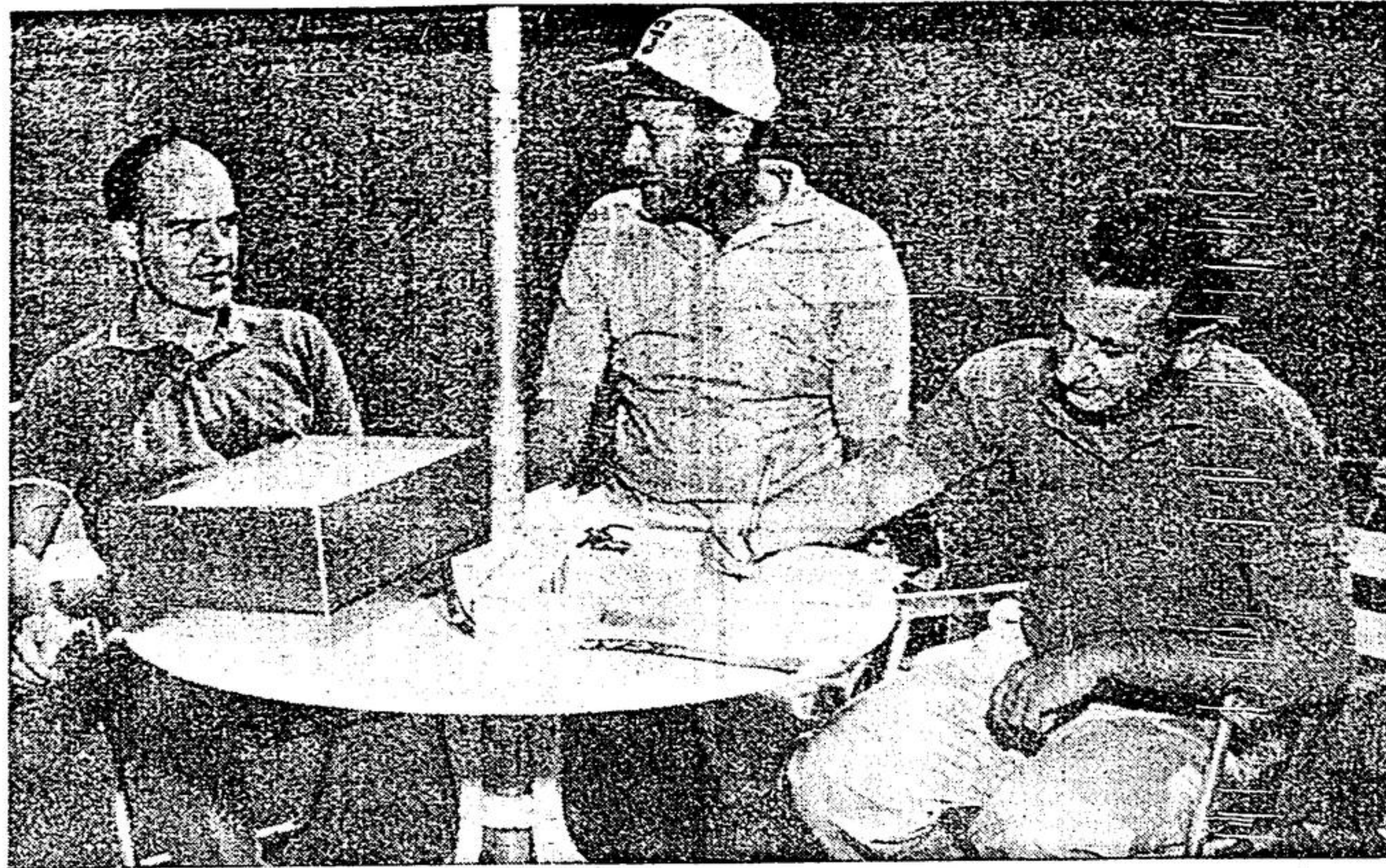

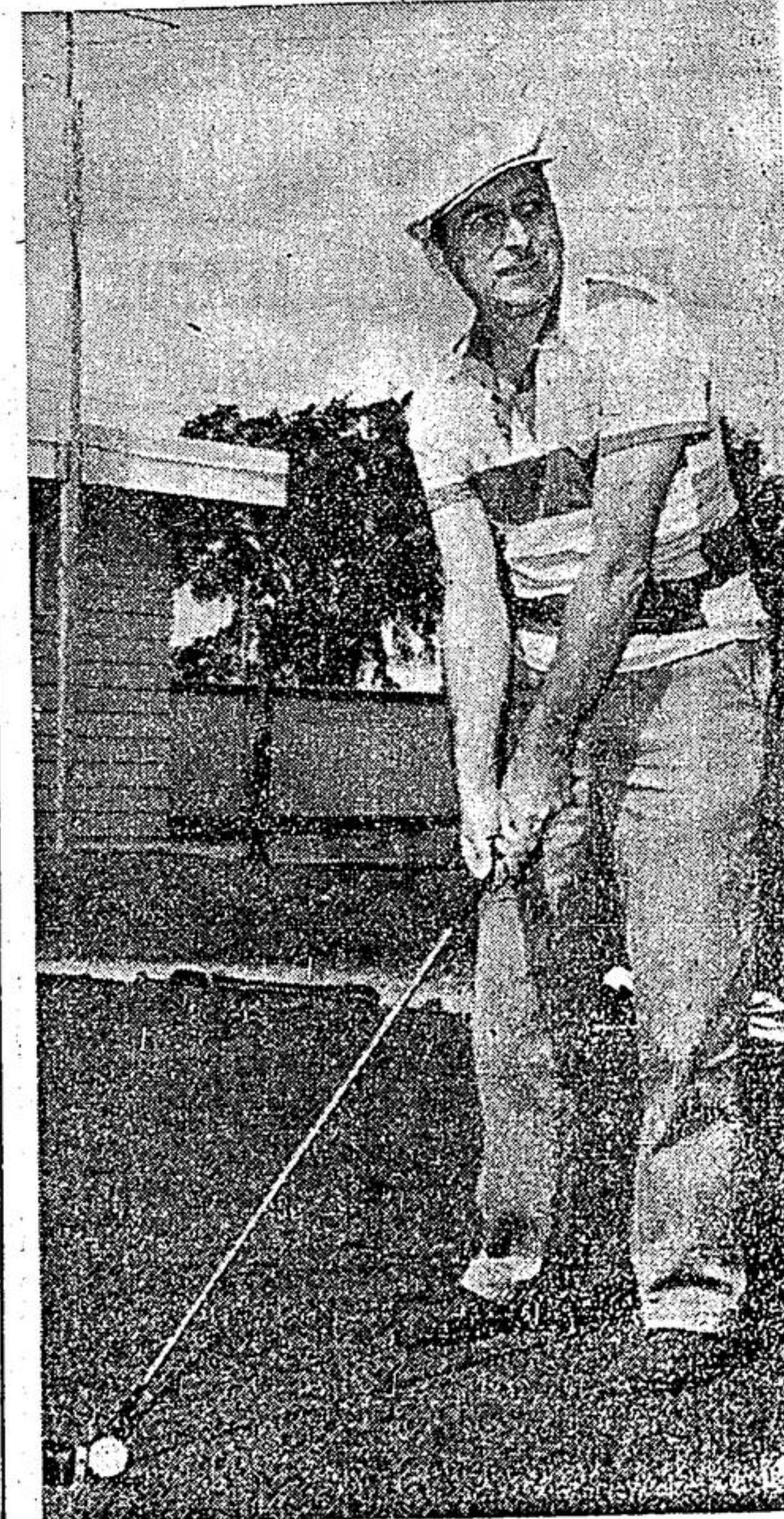

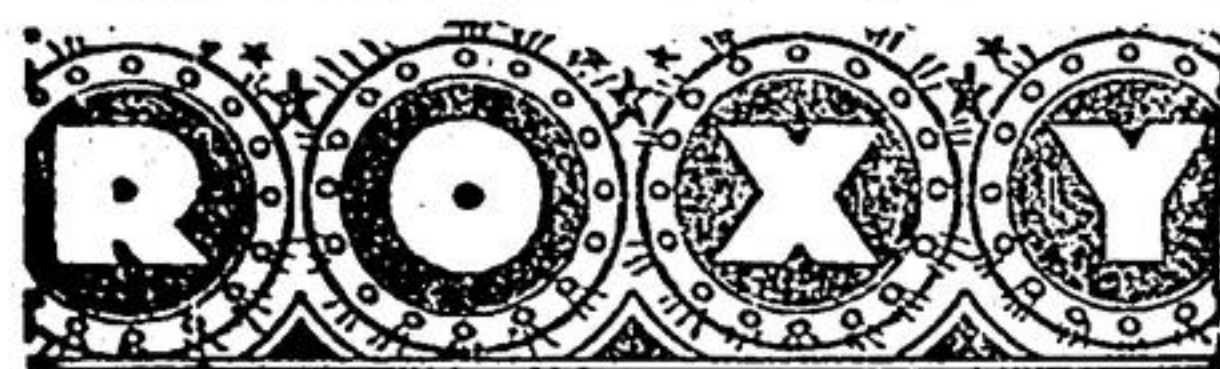
