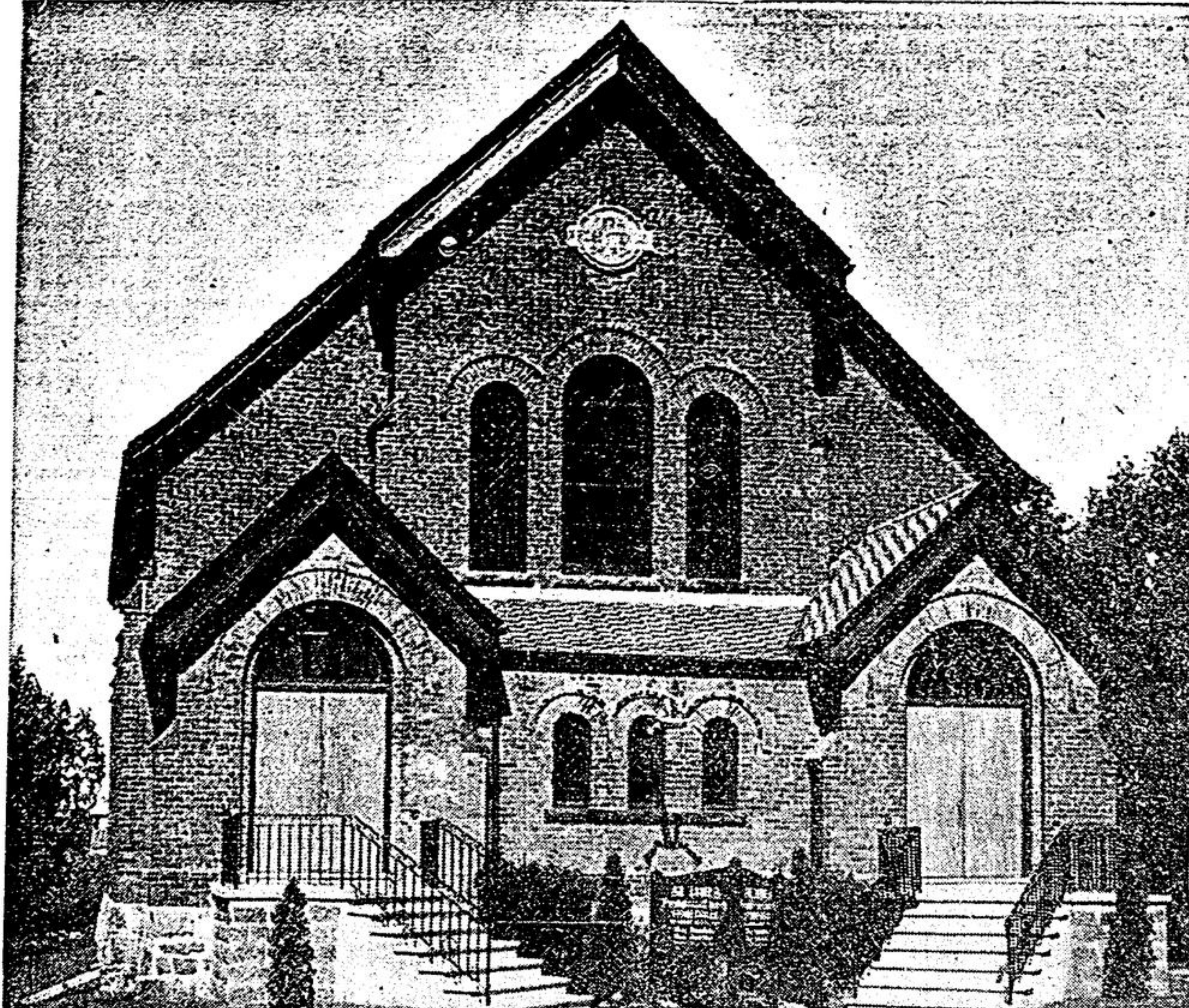


Local and Personal Happenings
