## From Grade Eight to Grade Nine, A Major Step For Students

As a new high school student, you will notice many changes when you return to classes this September. In Grade 8, you were a senior student. You enjoyed a great deal of prestige as a leader in your school. In Grade 9, you will be at the bottom of the list in prestige. Sometimes, boys and girls find this a little difficult to take.

Then, too, you may have been able without unusual effort to stand among the top pupils in Grade 8. But in Grade 9, you may find the competition somewhat keener. All the ablest pupils of several elementary schools are now with you.

A wide variety of school activities and interest groups will make demands on your time. You will have to make wise decisions about your choice of activities. Students sometimes become so involved in extra-curricular activities that they fall in their academic work.

You undoubtedly had a strong loyalty to your elementary school. This will have to be replaced, to a great extent, by a new loyalty to your new school. It's Up to You -

You will be greeted by new rules and regulations. You will be considered more as an adult and will be expected to take greater responsibilities for your own conduct and progress.

You may find that you have to travel longer distances to school, perhaps by bus, which will mean getting up a bit earlier in the morning.

You will probably have more homework to do. You will find, likely, that you will have to become accustomed to more teachers. You may find moving from classroom to classroom several times a day confusing at first, and you may be confused by the larger buildings and greater numbers of students.

But while many adjustments have to be made, remember these facts:

**You Can Do It -**  
Thousands of other boys and girls make a satisfactory adjustment and you can do the same. The teachers are ready to offer their help and understanding. Guidance counsellors are also available to help you at any time with special difficulties.

To make your life in high school easier, be loyal to your new school. Be regular and prompt, keeping in mind that school time is for school activities. Help build up the good reputation of your school. Boost your school activities.

Know your timetable and budget your homework. Obey school rules and encourage others to obey them; they were made in the best interests of all. Do your own work and do not become dependent on others. Make Work Count -

Prove yourself to be industrious, interested and co-operative, and you cannot fail to gain a great deal from your secondary school experience. First impressions are important. If you "get off on the right foot," establish good relationships with your teachers and act in a decent manner at all times, your days will be happy and profitable.

How do you know if you have the necessary ability to graduate? Frank discussions with your teachers, guidance counsellors and others, together with your own observations, will help you answer this question. Above all, do not underestimate your own ability.

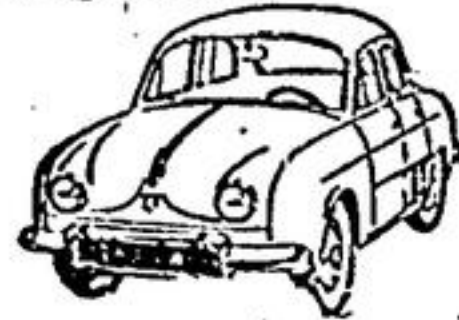
