An unusual story of a driver's licence suspension dating back to 1943 was told to Magistrate F. S. Ebbs in courts, last week.

Wilmot Tweedie, 57, of Greenwood, was charged with drunkdriving, driving while disqualified, unlawful possesion of a driver's licence and unlawful possession of a registration permit.

The crown withdrew the latter two charges and the Magistrate dismissed the second charge of driving while under disqualifica-

In dismissing the secon charge Magistrate Ebbs said there was doubt whether Tweedie had been notified of the second suspension in 1947.

Tweedies' licence was first suspended in 1943 after he was involved in an accident. The reason for the suspension was physical disability. He did not know how long the suspension lasted but obtained another driving licence later. According to the record, it too was suspended indefinitely after an accident in 1947.

Prior to the arrest and subsequent charge in court Tuesday, Tweedie got another driving licence and also was able to cover his car with insurance.

Magistrate Ebbs reduced the drunk driving charge to impairment and fined Tweedie \$100 and costs or 10 days. Tweedie's driving licence was suspended

# Uxbridge Man Given 7-Day

A good memory failed to convince Magistrate F. S. Ebbs during a case of having care or control while intoxicated in Magistrate's Court recently.

Michael Zariahyle, 52, of Uxbridge, testified that "usually when I'm drunk I can't remember anything but I remember everything!"

After being arrested by Harold Hockins of the Whitby Detachment of the OPP when he noticed Zariahyle's car weaving along the road, a breathalizer test was administered.

Corporal William Warner of folks who have relatives living the Whitby OPP conducted the tests for the intoxication and told the court there was no doubt in his mind that Zariahyle was drunk. Magistrate Ebbs found Zariahyle guilty and sentenced him to seven days in jail, and ordered him to pay court costs or an additional seven days, impounded his car for three months and suspended his
