Claremont Peewees defeated Dunbarton in two games on Saturday to win the first round of their inter-league play-offs. The first game played at Dunbarton in the afternoon was a close contest with Claremont coming from behind in the fifth inning to tie the score 7-7 and then pull ahead in the seventh with two more runs, making the final score 9-7. Dunbarton also used two pitchers, Phillips and Ryan with Warren Hall completing the battery.

\$25,000 Campaign for Retarded Children

A goal of \$25,000 has been set by the 1960 Campaign Committee of the Ajax, Pickering and Whitby Association for Retarded Children, for the annual Campaign for funds to be held the week of October 17th. Funds will be used to finish building the new school for retarded children, now nearing completion in Ajax and to pay for the year's operating expenses. Members of this year's Committee are: Mayor Wm. A. Parlin, Campaign chairman; Mrs. F. Conant, Canvass Chairman; Mrs. M. Browning, Treasurer; Mrs. N. Fallon, Secretary; and Mrs. A. S. Tranter, Public Information. At their first meeting, held in Ajax Council Chambers, they laid plans for the door-to-door canvass which will be carried out by local residents. "Let's Finish the School" is the slogan for the new building.

Permission to Remove Station Irks Council

The Canadian National Railways added more fuel to an already simmering fire in the Township of Uxbridge when they submitted a letter to Council requesting permission to remove the C.N.R. station in the hamlet of Goodwood. The station was demolished several months ago. The letter was presented at a regular meeting last week. Permission was refused. "They tore down a better building than they erected," stated Reeve Earl Dowswell. In a statement from the railroad, it was suggested that the building was in a dilapidated and dangerous condition. Reeve Dowswell contended that the present structures now on the station site were sub-standard. He charged that the Company had received no authorization from the Building Inspector to erect such a building. "Mr. Bunker was never consulted by the C.N.R.," he continued. He suggested that the residents of Goodwood had not taken too kindly to the railroad's action in the matter.

Pickering Farmer Finds Pasture Mowed by Twp.

A Pickering Township farmer returned home to discover that his three acre pasture field had been neatly mowed. On further investigation into the incident, he learned that the work had been done on orders from the Township Weed Inspector, Mr. Harry Ashton. The ratepayer objected to the practice when he attended a special meeting of Council on Monday night.

Mr. Ashton, present at the meeting, informed the members that he had received complaints of weeds on the property of Mel Carlton, White's Sideroad. Neither the owner nor his wife were home at the time. Reeve Sherman Scott stated that, according to the Act, no official notice had to be given when the property included less than nine acres. Mr. Ashton said he had been plagued with complaints regarding weeds from many parts of the township, especially in an area from Kinsale, north to Claremont. Mr. Carlton said he had pastured a calf on the property throughout the summer and had intended to put three cows in the field on the weekend.

Brigade to Arrange A New Contract

It is likely that a new fire contract will be arranged between the Claremont brigade and the Township of Uxbridge, according to information presented to a regular meeting of Council last week. Under the present arrangement, the Claremont Unit is paid on a per fire basis. The Claremont brigade has served an area in Uxbridge bordering on conc. 4 and 5. It is served by the Claremont telephone exchange. The Stouffville, Uxbridge and Mt. Albert boundaries are also divided according to the telephone divisions. Reeve Earl Dowswell suggested that in cases of borderline fires, he felt no brigade would refuse to attend.

Chicken Ranch For Altona ?

Uxbridge Twp. To Consider New Loader

Uxbridge Township Council will consider the purchase of a new loader. The motion was presented to a regular meeting last week by Councillor Norman Hogg. The decision was reached after the Road Supt., Mr. Stan Slack stated that the present tractor-loader was not heavy enough to do the work. He noted that it was continually in need of repairs. Councillor Hogg pointed out that the Township of Whitchurch had recently purchased a loader that could be used for both summer and winter work. Councillor Alvin Redshaw contended that such a lay-out might place a strain on their 1960 road budget.

\$7,000 in Culverts Outstanding

More than \$7,000 worth of installed culverts in private driveways are unpaid in the Township of Pickering, according to Dep-Reeve Ross Hawthorne. The matter was discussed briefly at a special meeting of Council on Monday night. The exact number of culverts was not revealed. They would range in price from \$35 to \$60 apiece, according to size. Uxbridge Man Given 7-Day Jail Term

A good memory failed to convince Magistrate F. S. Ebbs during a case of having care or control while intoxicated in Magistrate's Court recently. Michael Zariyahlye, 52, of Uxbridge, testified that "usually when I'm drunk I can't remember anything but I remember everything!" After being arrested by Harold Hockins of the OPP when he noticed Zariyahlye's car weaving along the road, a breathalyzer test was administered. Corporal William Warner of the Whitby OPP conducted the tests for the intoxication and told the court there was no doubt in his mind that Zariyahlye was drunk. Magistrate Ebbs found Zariyahlye guilty and sentenced him to seven days in jail, and ordered him to pay court costs or an additional seven days. Impounded his car for three months and suspended his licence to drive for six months.

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
