Charles Hooper Visits U. S. S. R.

Mr. Charles Hooper of Buttonville is still collecting his thoughts and sorting out impressions after a flying 16-day tour of the Scandinavian countries and Russia. Flying in every sense of the word, for the group he accompanied covered thousands of air miles in the time they were abroad. Busses were used occasionally, when the project to be visited lay within a hundred miles or so of a main centre, but for the most part low-flying planes were their transport.

The desire to visit the Soviet Union to see farming their first hand was born a year ago, when Mr. Hooper visited the World's Fair at Brussels and was intrigued with the farm machinery in the Russian exhibit there. He said it made our equipment look like toys. The opportunity came sooner than he expected.

Early this year TV and Radio station CKNX at Wingham announced they would sponsor a Russian agricultural tour for 15 independent Ontario farmers. This group, (the first of its kind in either Canada or the States) would pay their own expenses, but be responsible to no governmental party, and be free to make their own assessment of everything they would see on the trip. The date for the tour would be late summer.

For Mr. Hooper there were several obstacles as far as time was concerned. For one thing, the harvest season was later than it had been for several years, and Mr. Hooper is a farmer. Then, too, his youngest daughter, Mary, was planning her wedding for September 17, and the party might not return in time for him to be present.

Meeting on Glen Major Greenbelt on Sept. 27

Fifty property owners in the Glen Major area of Uxbridge Township in addition to ratepayers in the adjoining townships of Reach and Pickering have been invited to a special meeting in Sky Loft Lodge on Tuesday evening, Sept. 27th, to discuss the possibility of setting up a 'greenbelt' zone in the Chalk Lake district.

Mr. G. Adams, a representative from the Ontario Department of Planning and Development will be in attendance.

The Uxbridge Council and Planning Board were prompted to arrange the gathering after they were presented with a 30-name petition in July. Mr. W.T. Tuttle who headed a three-party delegation suggested that the residents wished to protect their properties against the possible operation of a gravel pit in the area. At that time, Reeve Earl Downswell pointed out that a public meeting would permit all ratepayers to air both sides of the issue.
