Sports

In an exhibition football game last week Richmond Hill handed Stouffville its first defeat of the season. The Richmond Hill squad with two previous games under their belts, took advantage of our first game greenness and managed a 7-6 victory. The game was forced on us much earlier in the season than we had expected and as a result much of our time was spent in preparing the football field than in practising. After only a few practices and still fewer plays worked out, Stouffville went into the game unprepared but determined to make the most of it in offensive and defensive experience. After the game had started, it became evident that we had a lot of kinks to get ironed out.

Our own clumsiness gave Richmond Hill a touchdown and a number of free first-downs. Our team was penalized repeatedly and even a 60 yd. touchdown which would have won the game for us, was called back. The feeling with the team was, "We were unsatisfied with our performance, but have profited by our mistakes and gained some valuable experience." Despite the score, stand-out Stouffville performers were turned in by galloping Lloyd Graves and hard-tackling Barry McLean. Travis Suggen, fill-in halfback for injured Roger Stover, played well and carried the ball for Stouffville's only touchdown.

Last Monday the Stouffville squad went into action again, this time against Aurora. It was an exhibition game also, and was used to test try-outs and pick the final team. Despite the score (an embarrassing 26-0), individual players turned in fine performance and we accomplished our purpose by using every play we knew and generally getting the feel of the game.

One thing that was evident in this game that was missing in the previous one, was spirit. This time we had a yelling driving team of boys who took their football seriously and fought all the way. Once again Barry McLean continued to break up plays by repeatedly sending Aurora back-fielders crashing to earth. Alan (the straight-arm) Boyd shook off would-be tacklers easily and ran for some good gains. The final team has been picked and has a week of hard practising ahead before it meets Markham in the first league game of the season. We now have the team, the plays and the initiative we needed—Markham, here we come.
