Following a brief illness of only two days, Mrs. Delhia Peacock, conc. 9, Markham, passed away suddenly in the Scarborough General Hospital. She was in her 73rd year. The deceased was admitted to hospital only on Monday, Sept. 26th. She died on the following Wednesday at 2.30 p.m.

Born in Scarborough, Aug. 5, 1888, she was the former Delhia Thomas, daughter of the late W. H. Thomas and Mary Robb. Her husband, the late Obadiah Peacock predeceased her in August, 1950. She was identified with the Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Peacock had resided at the farm residence, conc. 9, Markham, for the past 37 years. She was a link in a close family relationship which included one son, William, at home and four daughters, Marjorie (Mrs. Roy Smith, Bethesda; Mildred (Mrs. Kenneth Graham), Markham; Margaret (Mrs. Wm. Giles Inviting Public To See New Cars

Friday and Saturday of this week, Oct. 7th and 8th, Giles Chevrolet - Oldsmobile, Stouffville, is holding "open house" at the show-rooms on Main St. They'll be showing off the new

1961 Chev and Oldsmobile models as well as Corvair and new compact Olds. There'll be lucky door prizes and an interesting feature on display will be a 1917 Chevrolet Touring car.

Chevrolet passenger cars are 1.5 inches shorter and 2.4 inches narrower. Overall length is 209.3 inches and overall width is 78.4 inches.

Completely changed styling, which provides easier loading for both passengers and luggage, is featured in the regular line of passenger cars. The entire body, from floor to roof and grille to rear bumper, is new. Prime design emphasis has been placed on functionalism with thrift.

Among the features of the new body are: Easier entrance to passenger compartments, large, more accessible luggage space, with the trunk loading level lowered as much as 10.5 inches; improved seat height and overhead visibility, increasing the ease of parking.

Eighteen different models will be offered in the full-size Oldsmobile line for 1961, incorporating striking changes in styling and design. The cars are shorter and narrower than 1960 models. Completely redesigned for 1961 are the bodies for the entire 1961 Oldsmobile range. Oldsmobile offers a distinctively different body for the top-line 98.

While 1961 styling gives the cars a long look, overall length and width have actually been reduced. The Dynamic 88 and Su-

per 88 are 5.6 in. shorter than 1960 models. Although interior widths remain approximately the same, exterior width is 3.8 inches less.
