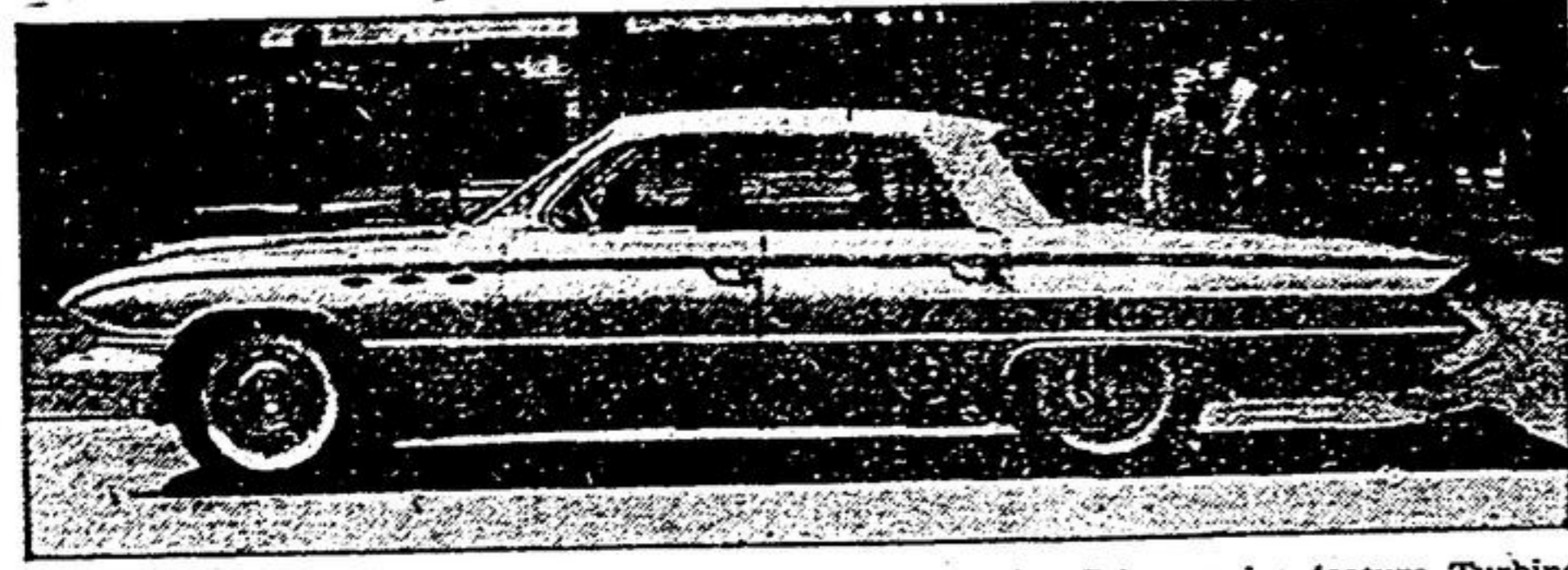

Markham Fair Was Held in Stouffville 85 Years Ago

On October 5th and 6th, 1875, eighty-five years ago, the Markham Fair was held in Stouffville. It had been agreed at an earlier meeting of the Board of Markham and Whitechurch Agricultural Societies, that the two should arrange to hold a combined fair for that year. Entries were filed by exhibitors with Wm. Braithwaite of Unionville, Secretary of Markham Board, and M. Jones of Bloomington, Secretary of the Whitechurch Board. Fifteen hundred entries were received. The crowd was not large, however, due to the wet weather and poor roads.
