Bruce Harper High in Pasture Competition

A York County farmer, Bruce Harper of Stouffville, was selected last week as one of the top winners in the Ontario Pasture Competition. His pasture had previously won the championship for York County, as well as the Zone Championship for the counties from York east to Lennox and Addington. As one of the five finalists for Ontario, the judges placed the Harper pasture second. Top prize winner was Herb Watson of Ingleswood.

Mr. Harper pastures about 35 milking Holsteins on 18 acres on his farm just south of Stouffville. He rotates the herd regularly in a field which is divided into three sections. He gets most of his pasture production from Timothy, Brome Grass, Ladine Clover and Alfalfa. An overhead sprinkler irrigation system is used to ensure adequate moisture for the full growing season. Clipping and harrowing as often as necessary are also essential features of the Harper pasture program.

The Provincial Judges were Doctor W. E. Tossel, O.A.C., Guelph; Joe Lanthier, Master Feeds Farm, Thornhill; and John Dalrymple, of the Kemptville Agricultural School. Mr. Harper receives a prize of \$125 for standing second in Ontario.

Split-Second Death Count

Out of automotive crash research at Cornell University Medical College has come the terrifying picture of what happens to steel and glass, flesh and blood, in the split second a human being is hurled to eternity. This is the slow-motion reconstruction of what happens when a car, travelling 55 miles an hour, hits a tree.

1/10 Second
 Front bumper and chrome frosting of the grill collapses. Slivers of steel penetrate the tree one and a half inches or more.

2/10 Second
 Hood crumples as it rises, smashing into windshield. Spinning rear wheels leave ground. Grill disintegrates. The fenders come in contact with the tree, forcing rear parts to splay out over the front doors. Heavy structural members of the car begin to act as a brake on the terrific forward momentum of the 2 1/2 ton body. But the driver's body continues to move forward at the vehicle's original speed, a force of 20 times gravity, his body weighing 3,200 lbs. His legs, ramrod straight, snap at the knee joints.

3/10 Second
 Driver's body is now off the seat, torso upright, his broken knees pressing against the dashboard. Plastic and steel frame of the steering wheel begins to bend under his terrible death grip. His head is now near the sun visor, his chest above the steering column.

4/10 Second
 Car's front 24 inches have been completely demolished but the rear end is still travelling at an estimated 35 miles an hour. Driver's body is still travelling at 55 miles an hour. The half-ton motor block crunches into the tree. Rear of the car, like a bucking horse, rises high enough to scrape bark off low branches.

5/10 Second
 Driver's fear-frozen hands bend the steering column into an almost vertical position. The force of gravity impales him on the steering wheel shaft. Jagged steel punctures lung and intercostal arteries. Blood spurts into his lungs.

6/10 Second
 So great is the force of the impact that the driver's feet are ripped from his tightly-laced shoes. The brake pedal shears off at the floor boards. Chassis bends in the middle, shearing body bolts. Driver's head smashes into the windshield. Rear of the car begins its downward fall, spinning

wheels digging into the ground.
7/10 Second
 The entire, writhing body of the car is forced out of shape. Hinges tear. Doors spring open.

In one last convulsion the seat rams forward, pinning the driver against the cruel steel of the steering shaft. Blood leaps from his mouth, shock has frozen his heart. **HE IS NOW DEAD!**

Elapsed time — seven-tenths of a second.

Home Fire Check a Wise Plan

Your home is your castle! This tradition is sacred to the program of volunteer home inspection by the fire service. That is why the inspection of any home is subject to the friendly wish of the owner or tenant without involvement of any kind.

If a fire fighter knocks at your door, let him in. His aim is to help you uncover fire hazards and bring them to attention.

He will ask to see kitchen, basement, yard. If you're wise, you will accept his suggestions, as have hundreds of thousands of Canadians.

What he has to say concerns the safety of your home, perhaps your own life. There's no expense to you and it doesn't add to your taxes.

He's a person of pleasant personality, carefully selected for the job. If his call is inconvenient, he will leave courteously. He is at your door either under a planned municipal program—or at your own invitation.

While public and commercial buildings in Canada must submit to a rigid fire inspection, the home and the owner's privacy are respected. Nevertheless it is in the home that three-quarters of all fires occur, so often with tragic loss of family life.

Effective Approach
 More and more across the nation, voluntary or courtesy home inspection has been established as an effective approach to the problem. While the program is highlighted during Fire Prevention Week, it can apply throughout the year.

Unless specifically asked, they confine their attention to basement and yard. Besides trash, they are alert to storage of flammable liquids and stove ashes, smoke pipes and chimneys, and faulty or frayed wiring. They look for obviously unsafe or doubtful conditions. They will give you a private and personal written report on their findings, without use of your name and without gossip about the neighbors. And they will not advise on repairs or equipment suppliers.

Rest Up to You
 It's been a completely friendly call, and the rest is up to you. As the fire services say, "The best fires we fight in the home are those that never happen."

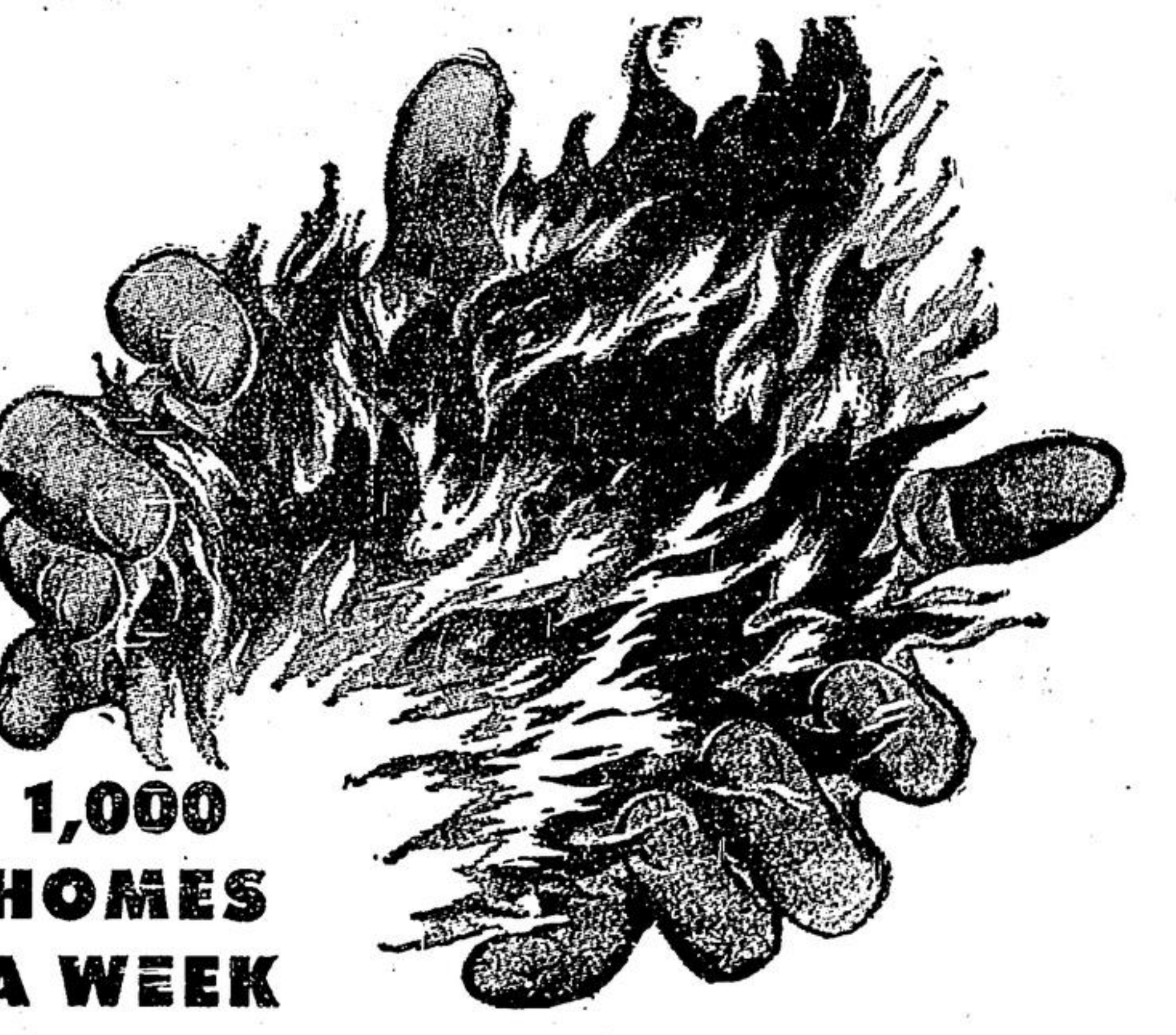
