Honeymoon Trip to Fair Recalled by Uxbridge Couple

On Sunday, October 2nd, 1900, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Ashenurst celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. They were at home to about 175 friends and relatives during the afternoon and evening. On October 3rd, 1900, Mr. and Mrs. Ashenurst were married in the Stouffville Anglican Church. A day at Markham Fair constituted their honeymoon. They travelled from home to Stouffville by horse and buggy, then to Markham on the train. Mr. Ashenurst was born on the fifth concession, Uxbridge township, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ashenurst. He attended the Webb public school. Mrs. Ashenurst, the former Hannah Linton, was born near Claremont and attended Cedar Creek school. Following their marriage, the happy couple resided on their farm on the 4th concession of Uxbridge for 47 years before retiring and moving to Uxbridge town. To the couple were born four

girls: (Ola) Mrs. Howard Forsythe, of Goodwood; (Greta) Mrs. Clayton Hill of Claremont; (Laura) Mrs. M. C. Tucker of Apsley and (Hilda) Mrs. Bruce Bailey of Utica. They have three grandchildren, Mr. John Hill, Miss Lorna Hill and Alan Bailey. Mr. and Mrs. Ashenurst received many cards, flowers and gifts. Fire Destroys Summer Home Of Chiropractor

The summer residence of a Toronto chiropractor was destroyed by fire during the early hours of Saturday morning on the Uxbridge-Pickering townline, two miles east of Altona. The white frame bungalow, owned by Dr. Lavis was engulfed in flames by the time the Claremont brigade arrived on the scene. The outbreak was spotted by a patrolling officer of the Ontario Provincial Police at Whitby. The house was vacant at the time. Since the fire occurred at 5 a.m., nothing could be saved from the home. A neighbour, Mrs. Everett Hammond was awakened by the police officer prior to the arrival of Scemem. Even at that time, flames were

visible from the structure. The cause of the outbreak was not immediately determined.

Resigns From Office

Townline Project in '61 Program

Construction work on the Uxbridge-Whitchurch townline road will be placed in the 1961 budgets of both municipalities according to an agreement reached following a meeting of the two township councils. The cost of the project has been estimated at \$4,000. Uxbridge and Whitchurch will each set aside \$2,000 for the work. The stretch of road includes lots 1-3 in Whitchurch and lots 3-5 in Uxbridge. Oppose Purchase of Building Site

Pickering Township council by majority vote last week, decided to purchase 4.8 acres of land as a site for a future municipal building at the north-east corner of Brock Road and No. 2 Highways. Councillors Harvey Spang and Edgar James voted in the negative. The land is owned by Mr. Kenneth Clark and may be purchased for \$20,000. Reeve Sherman Scott termed it one of the choicest pieces of land in the township. He said Mr. Clark had turned down offers of higher amounts, from oil companies who wanted to put a service station on the corner. He said Mr. Clark would sell to the township for this amount; if it was in the agreement that if the township at a future date wished to sell the property, it would be sold back to him for the purchase price. The council was then polled on the matter of having such a site at this location. Councillor Edgar James said he felt the municipal building should be in the centre of the township, but that this site was preferable to one mentioned at Liverpool. Councillor Harvey Spang said he would prefer the building in the centre of the township. Deputy-reeve Ross Hawthorne said that Brougham geographically was the centre of the township but the site at No. 2 and Brock road was nearer the centre of population and that it was wise to purchase for future development. Councillor Clifford Laycox said he felt that the population is in the south end and so should the government buildings be located there. Councillor Ross Deakin said when he first mentioned a site at Liverpool, he meant the site to be for police and fire services, not the municipal building. Councillor Harry Boyes said he felt that the location at Brock Road and No. 2 was ideal.
