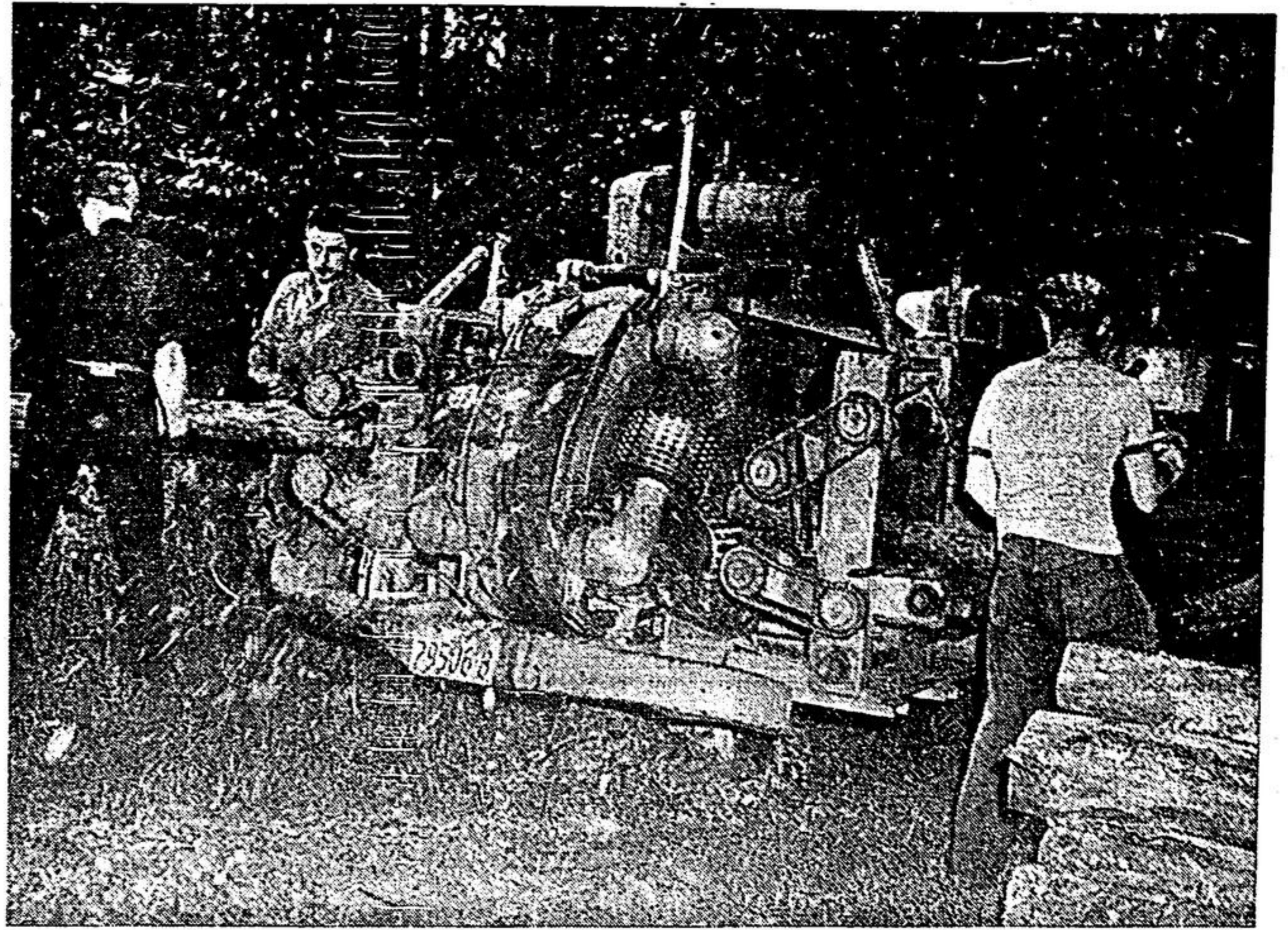

Cleans Vivian Pulpwood, 80 Cords Per Day

A debarking machine which can clean 80 cords of pulpwood a day, has been busy in the bush at Vivian, Whitchurch Twp., preparing pulpwood provided by thinning operations at the forest. The logs now being processed were some not taken out of the bush last winter. The government considers the sale of pulpwood covers the expense of protecting and servicing an area such as Vivian.

Members of the press, including A. G. Thompson of The Stouffville Tribune, were recently taken on a tour of Department of Lands & Forests projects in the area, and one of their stops was at Vivian forest. The machine for debarking which The Tribune saw in operation was a Cambio Barker owned by the Wagner Co.

Thinning of the trees, started after some years of growth, continues until there are only an average of 150 trees left to the acre. No forest has reached the age where it is in final thinning. The government considers that it requires 80 years for a tree to reach maturity.

Fire Protection

Peter Monohan who is in charge at Vivian, gave the reporters a demonstration of some of the equipment for fire protection. Few fires occur; for two reasons: no feed exists for wild life, the trees are set so close together as to smother out all undergrowth; no fishing is provided on the forest properties as it is considered the public would not observe sufficient caution to protect the forest while going to fish.

Hall of Fame For Royal

Designed to honour individuals who have made some outstanding contribution to agriculture in past years, a Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame will be established during the 1960 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, which will be held here from November 11 to 19.

Sparked by W. P. Watson, Live Stock Commissioner for the Province of Ontario, a movement for such a project has been underway for some time.

The Royal Agricultural Winter Fair will act as sponsor of the Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame and all agricultural groups and organizations across the nation are being urged to actively support this undertaking.

Objects of the proposed Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame include recognition of individuals for outstanding contributions to agriculture, the establishment of a portrait gallery and the promotion of interest in the study of agriculture generally.
