During the morning session the discussion was centred on "Testing methods". At noon hour members of Brown's Corners Church Harmony Club served a buffet luncheon to approximately 30 teachers.

**Date Stone Laid** — For the second time within a few weeks, last Sunday morning the sun shone brilliantly as the congregation of Brown's Corners United Church met outside following the morning service for the setting of the new date stone to mark the new addition to the church which is presently being built.

Dr. A. F. Binnington, pastor, read passages from 1 Corinthians 29:10-18, and Hagai 1:12-15, as the congregation gathered round the place near the doorway of the new structure where the stone was laid.

Mr. Norman Reid, clerk of session, held the copper cylinder to be inserted behind the new stone. In it were: (1) The Sector proposals for 1960, and the 1st letter to the congregation; (2) Presbytery minutes dated April 26, 1963, at which meeting our congregation was represented and plans were presented for Extension and official consent was given by Presbytery and recorded in these minutes; (3) Church calendar for day of Sod-Turning, and pictures of July 24th, 1960, also Dr. Binnington's letter to congregation; (4) Economist & Sun July 28th, 1960 issue—included in this paper was a picture and report of ceremony; (5) Annual report, 1959; (6) Picture of the church, 1959; (7) Church calendars of Oct. 9 and 16; (8) Short sketch of our church area showing population; (9) Early history of Brown's Corners Church as recorded in Markham Township Historical sketch; (10) List of officers and church organizations; (11) United Church Observers of Oct. 1st and August 1, 1960 (the latter issue containing a prayer by minister Dr. Binnington).

Rev. Nofman Pick of Markham, President of York Presbytery, was presented with the trowel by Mr. Harold Coleman, chairman of sector, and proceeded to lay the stone, after which he spoke briefly and led cluded with the stermwshrdc in prayer. The service concluded with the singing of the Doxology.

Construction on the new building is progressing favourably, with most of the brickwork completed on the new part and the old brickwork replaced on the old building. It is expected the end of November will see completion of the work.

Mr. and Mrs. Neil Mortson and Mrs. Don Canning attended the Plowing Match at Springfield on Thursday.

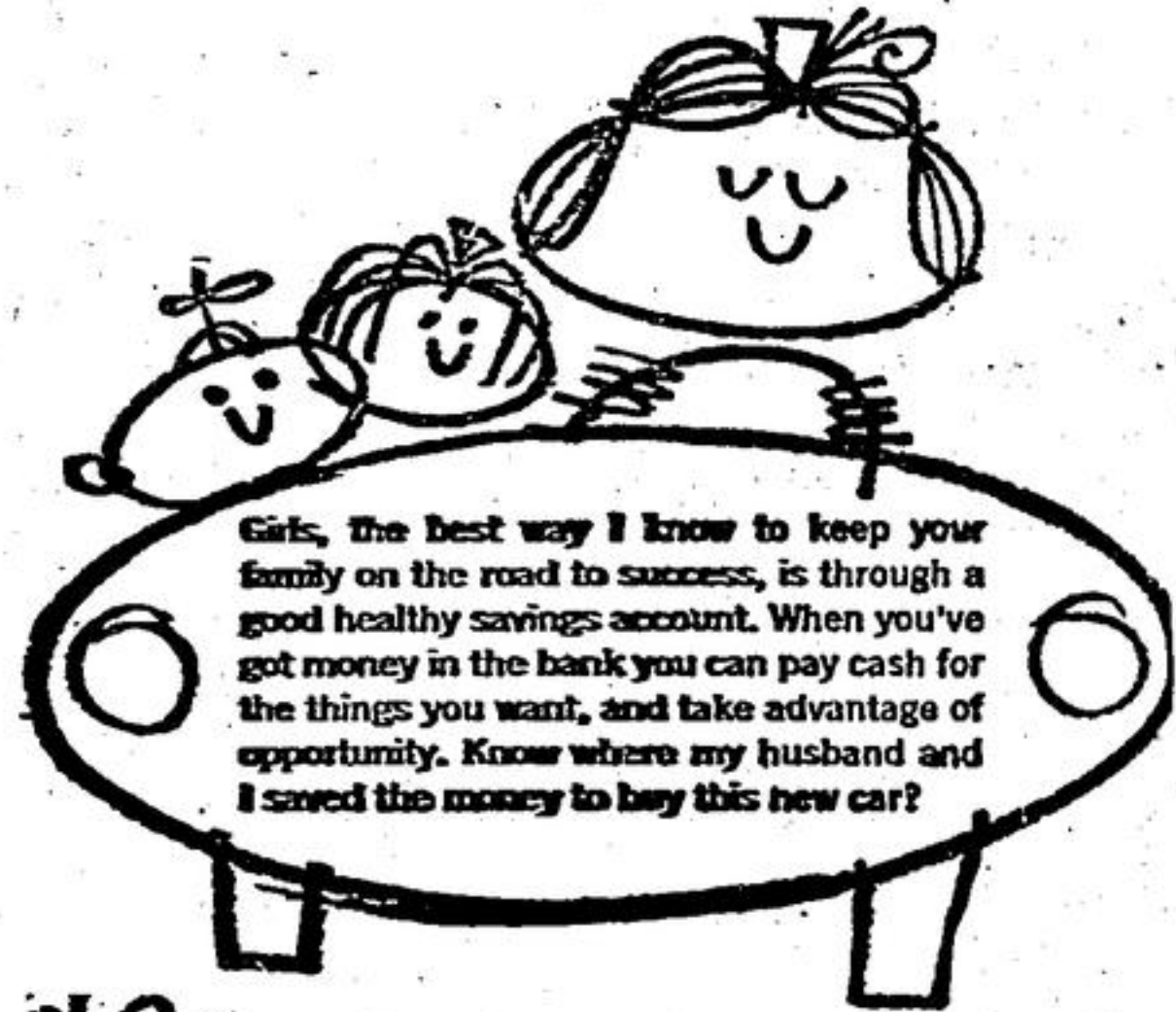
The many friends of Mr. Alf Smith of Cashel are sorry to hear of his illness. He is in the East General Hospital. A speedy recovery is wished for him.
