## Noted Professor To Speak At Pickering H.S.

The ninth annual Pickering Dist. High School Commencement Exercises will be held on Friday, November 18, 1960. The guest speaker will be Professor Douglas G. Lochhead B.A., B.L.S., M.A. of York University. Professor Lochhead, an author of note, is Chief Librarian at Canada's newest University. Among works published by Professor Lochhead are "The Heart is Fire," "Poems in Folle" and "It Is All Around".

Twenty Honour Graduation Diplomas (Grade 13) will be presented, along with 52 Graduation Diplomas (Gr. 12), and 91 Intermediate Certificates (Gr. 10).

Miss Eva Hasek, now a student at Victoria College, University of Toronto, will be the class Valedictorian.

Graduates will be returning from a wide variety of places. The Commercial Graduates and some General Course Graduates are now working in offices from Bowmanville to West Toronto.
