

HOW TO MAKE GOOD CIDER Good cider is part of the aut-

umn scene. If you are interested in making good cider, bacteriologists at the Ontario Agricultural College offer the following suggestions:

First, use only sound, ripe apples. If you want a tart flavour, try Yellow Transparent or Duchess. An aromatic flavour will result when Delicious or Snow apples are used. Northern Spy gives a mild-flavoured cider. Fall and winter apples are more desirable for cider, because of their high sugar content.

Wash the apples in a tank of water, stirring to get rid of dust, dirt, organisms and spray residue. Change the water sevcral times.

Extract the juices as soon a

possible after washing. Cylindrical graters do the best job. Strain the juice through clean cloths to memove the coarse particles. Then allow the juice to stand for 10 to 15 hours so that the very fine sediment may settle. Siphon the good juice off, being careful not to disturb the sediment.

If you don't want your cider to turn to vinegar, preserve it in clean barrels, vats or glass jugs. Add 14 ounces of sodium benzoate for every 10 gallons of cider, or pasteurize it in bottles in a water bath, kept at 175° F. for 20 minutes. Cool the bottles immediately.
