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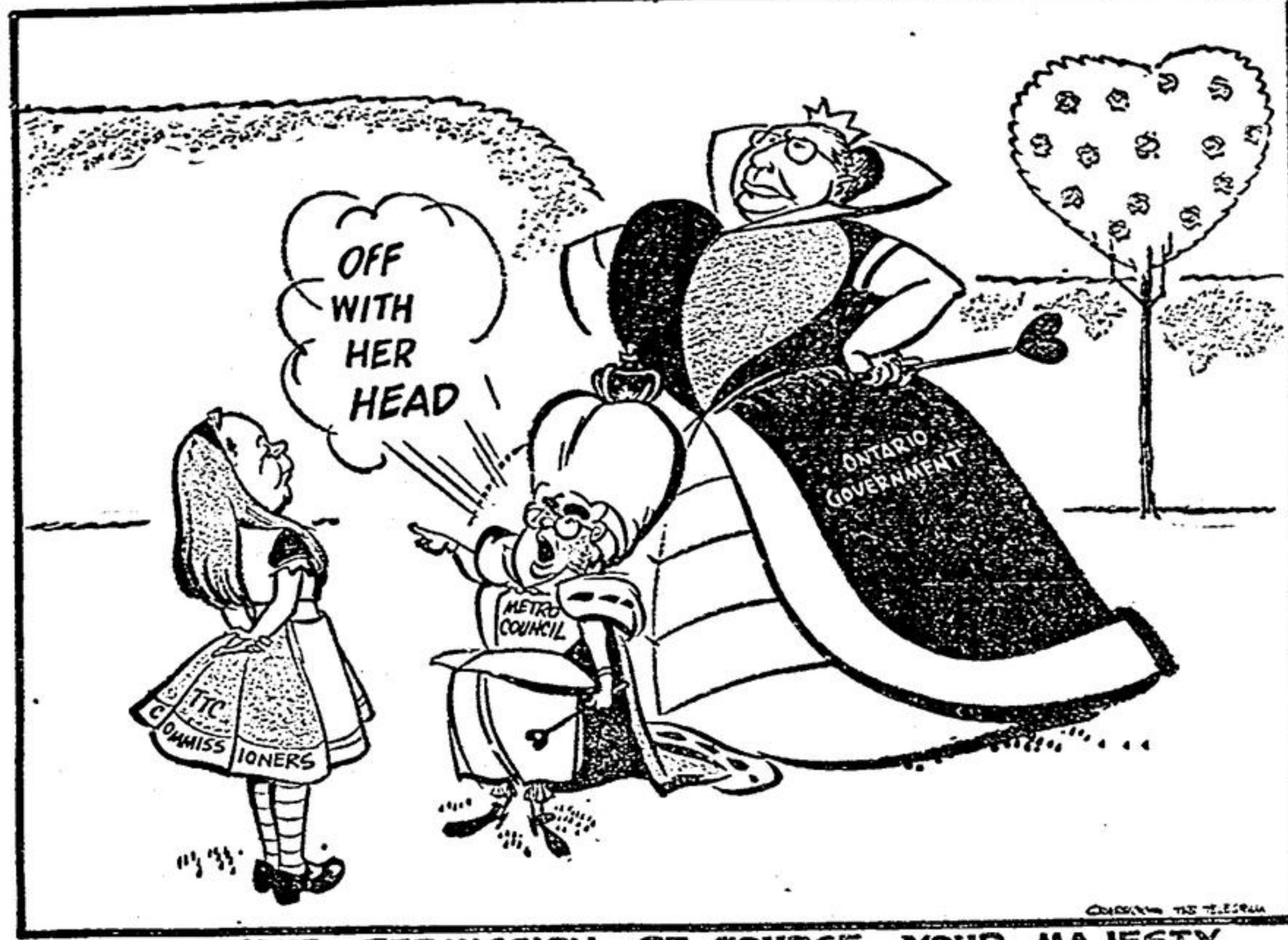
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Trustee, Councillor Clash Over Works Program

Allan Sumner, trustee for the Police Village of Thornhill, ran head-on into councillor John McNeil of Markham Township on Monday night and the two began a verbal barrage over public works in the village.

The debate arose as council discussed the advisability of paving the village streets prior to the laying of sewers.

Mr. Sumner stated that residents on Elizabeth St. had asked that the work proceed but Council had taken no action. Councillor Mumberson stated that it would be a Local Improvement job and so far, no petition had been received.

Mr. Sumner said the trustee board was being urged by residents to act.

"Where are these requests you're talking about? Have you anything in writing from anyone? You appear to be speaking for all the Trustees and the ratepayers too, without any written authority," declared councillor McNeil.

Mr. Sumner, pointing at councillor McNeil, said, "You know the people want the work done whether they have written it out or not."

"Don't you point at me; it's rude," shot back councillor McNeil.

Reeve Clark then brought his gavel into play.

Mr. Sumner said that he would report to the owners that the request was bogged down in council, and he walked out of the meeting.

School Bell Cairn Dedicated
Gold leaves fluttered in a gray drizzle Wednesday afternoon as Buttonville School children, their teachers, a few parents, officials and former students gathered to do honour to the old school bell. From its eerie location in the belfry of the old school, the bell rang out morning and noon, bringing children scurrying or creeping like snails to school for more than 80 years. It also roused the elders of the community to their duty at annual-meeting time.

In 1955, when the new addition was built, the old bell bowed to the push-button era and relinquished its authority. During the past summer the present school board (Chairman S. R. Patterson, Jack Harrott and Bill Hood, with Secty. Walter Craig) gave this symbol of the past the respect it deserves as they had it mounted on a stone cairn at the front of the new school building. The inscription it bears reads: — Erected 1960 by the Board of Trustees. In appreciation of all those who have contributed to Education in this community.

In his dedication address Mr. S. R. Patterson spoke of the bell as a symbol in the community of the "call to serve" which it has sent out over the years. No good comes by accident, said Mr. Patterson, "There is contribution of sacrifice, purpose and money."

Dr. A. F. Binnington, minister of the Victoria Square charge, performed the dedication service.

Fraser McTavish, a senior pupil at the school, was master of ceremonies, and the service con-

cluded with the singing of "The Queen."

Sentence Local Man On Fraud Charge

A 27-year-old Whitechurch man was sentenced to six months definite and six indeterminate for defrauding his employer of \$2,200.

Judge Robert Forsyth gave printer Douglas Spicer, of Cherry St., the sentence concurrent on each of 18 charges of fraud. A general sessions jury took almost three hours to find Spicer guilty on all charges.

The jury was told Spicer was manager of the A. R. G. Horne Ltd. printing Co., on George Street during November and December, 1959, and January, 1960. During that time, he received payments from a lingerie company for printing work done, but did not remit the full amount to his employers.

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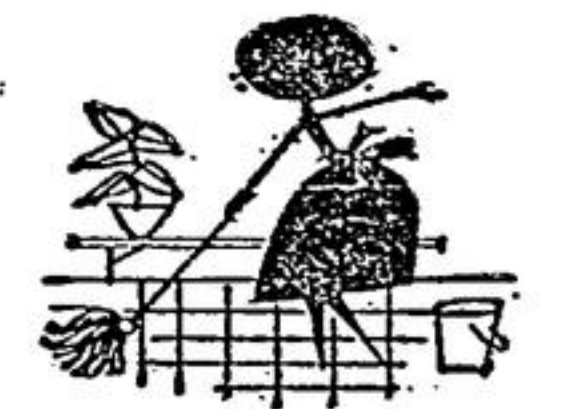
