

Former Clipper Goalie Returns To Haunt Stouffville Team

Joe Carpentier, a former stand-out netminder with the Stouffville Clippers a few seasons back, returned to haunt some of his mates on Friday night, regaled in a Ringwood uniform. It again was Carpentier in a familiar role. Ducking, dodging, kicking and grabbing, he grazed through sixty minutes of hockey to spark his mates to a 4-1 victory. It was Ringwood's second successive win and Stouffville's second loss in a row.

Carpentier, who appears to be off balance on many plays, has an amazing knack of getting a piece of a pad or glove in front of shots to direct them off the target. On Friday, only Stouffville's Gord Compert could find an opening in Carpentier's armour. He fired his team's lone tally at 19:30 of the first period.

On Ringwood's front line, Bruce Fockler wielded a potent goal-scoring stick and fired 3 goals for the winners. Bud Lehman notched one and assisted on two others. Gene More col-

lected a passing point on Lehman's drive. Although held off the score sheet, Jake Harman turned in a good game for the Ringwood squad. Guy Weeks and Compert were Stouffville's best.

Twelve penalties were handed out by referees Polly Minton and Russ Forfar, six to each team. Both clubs handed out some solid checks. In the game's early minutes, Gene More rocked Stouffville's Gord Compert. In the final frame, More was on the receiving end of a stiff jolt, thrown by defenceman Les Jarvis. In the Stouffville cage, goalie Geo. Martin looked good on drives by Jake Harman and More. Carpentier was equally brilliant on shots by Ray Pipher, Norm Neale and Compert. The most dazzling save of the night was pulled off by Carpentier in the first period. A bullet drive from the stick of Guy Weeks was grabbed out of the air as it headed for the top corner of the cage. The stop brought applause from the fans.

Redshaw Fires 3 Goals in Four Minutes for Claremont

With less than five minutes to play in a scheduled Community League contest on Friday night, Claremont trailed Ballantrae 4-2. Anyone who might have thought that the victory was in the bag for the Ballantrae boys, must have underestimated the goal-scoring potential of centre star, Wayne Redshaw.

At 15:15 of the final frame he whipped Dean Evans' pass into the Ballantrae cage to cut the lead down to one goal. At 17:15 he rounded the "Braves" net and parked the puck in the corner. With fifty seconds remaining in the contest, he intercepted a pass from linemate Jim Cherry to rifle the winner into the twine. In a desperate effort to split the points, coach Ron Barrand yanked goalie Ken Card from the cage but the time ran out before they could get their front-line attack organized.

For the second week in a row, it was a five point scoring spree for Claremont's Redshaw. In the five goals counted by the team on Friday night, the ex-Unionville forward collected 4 tallies and assisted on one other. Dean Evans blinked the light at the eight minute mark of the first period.

As a team effort, Ballantrae would have been full value for their victory. To date, one of the most improved clubs in the league, they gave goalie Wes

Evans a busy time between the pipes as they peppered him with 25 shots. Card in the Ballantrae cage blocked 16 pucks. Evans blocked double drives from the sticks of Frank Hendy and Bob Vince. He saved the day for his mates in the dying minutes of the contest when he robbed Ron Stewart on a wide-open chance. Gary Usherwood, Fred Kemford, Ron Stewart and Barry McLean were the Ballantrae marksmen.

Barry McLean, Stouffville's "mighty midjet" gave ample proof that he is eligible for community league competition. He kept pace with his linemates and was used on a regular shift. He rifled one of the nearest goals of the game, a low shot from the face-off to give Ballantrae a temporary 4-2 lead. Gary Usherwood appears headed for a good season and Bob Vince is a driving force up front. Jack Todd, an Uxbridge recruit, has added power to the forward line. The game's scoring was as follows:
