Safety Measures Urged

The mounting accident toll at the corner during the past summer has raised a public outery for precautionary action. The Tribune, in editorial comment has taken up the torch. Last week, in Newmarket Court, Magistrate Hollinrake described the intersection as "notorious".

On weekends, the east-west county road represented a death-trap. High-speed traffic moving both to and from Toronto along No. 48, was not required to slow up and the resulted collisions were usually of a serious nature. During week days, gravel truck traffic is heavy in all directions. In a personal interview with The Tribune, Highways Minister, Mr. Cass stated that the Department was hesitant about installing any measure that would tend to slow down the traffic on a main
