

## Phones for Farm at Fair

Visitors to the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair at Toronto will see the latest type of communication system designed for the farm family, displayed at a Bell Telephone exhibit. Called "Farm Interphone" the system combines the housetelephone with a wide range of intercommunication features through the use of loudspeaker microphones.

A farmer plowing or having, for example, could use Farm Interphone to communicate with the house. Another could have two-way conversation with his wife in the kitchen without leaving the orchard. The applications of this system are seemingly endless, Bell Telephone points out, and many have been tested in field trials. Although Farm Interphone is not yet available in Canada, it will probably be on the market some-

time in 1961. The basic Farm Interphone system consists of a master telephone in the house, an extension phone in the barn or other of a button, and by turning anoutbuilding and one or more other switch, use the intercom two-way loudspeakers located around the farm. Each telephone is equipped with a special loudspeaker - microphone and a button which enables the dairy, poultry house or shop phone to be used for intercom calls or regular phone calls.
