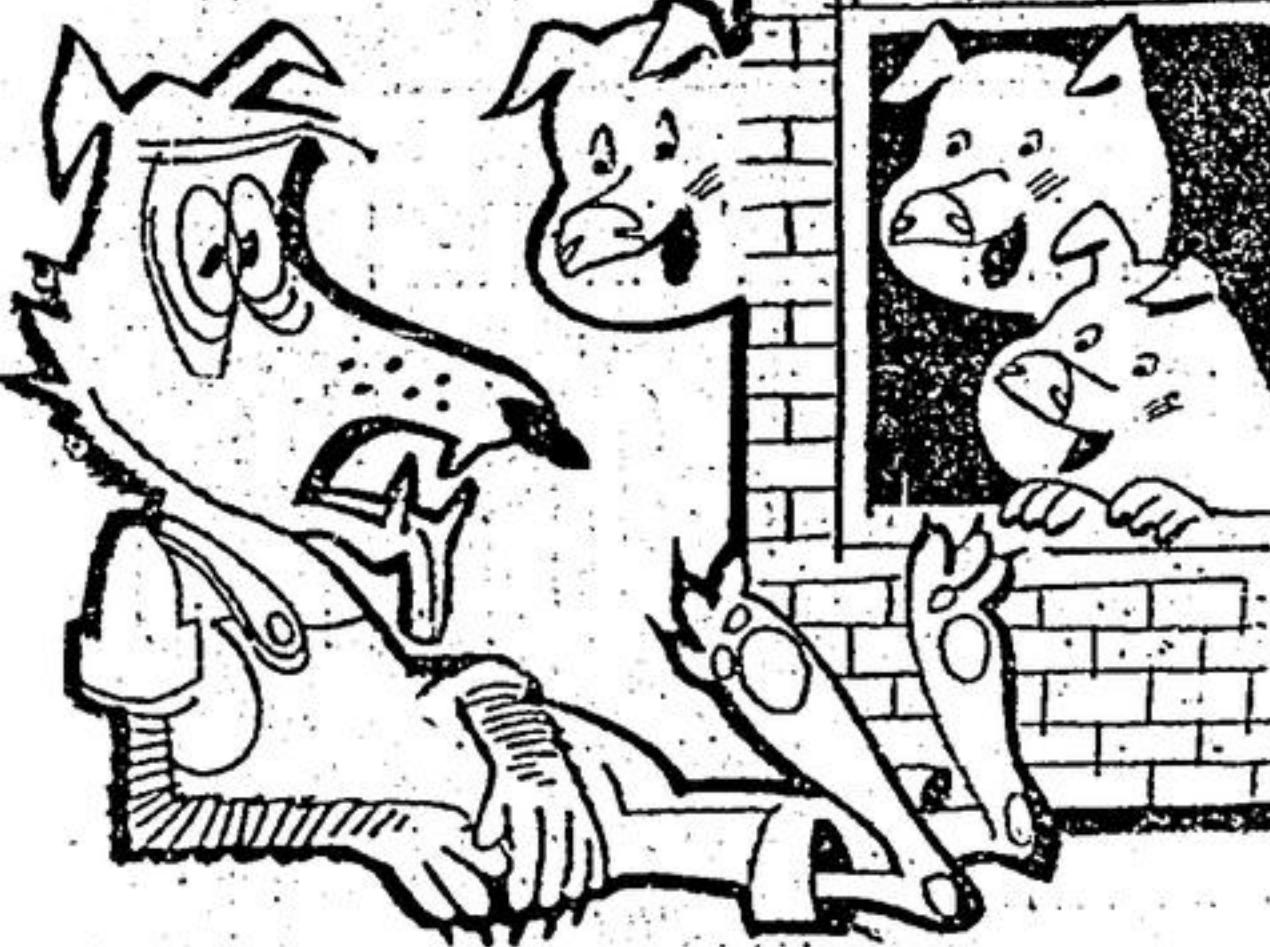

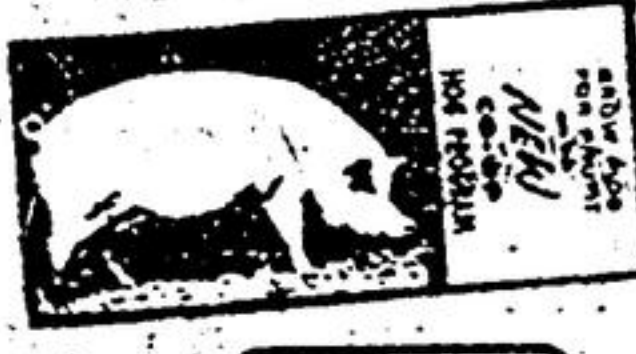

"Clean-up" Campaign in Markham Twp.

A request by Paul Sandor for a dog kennel licence in a residential section of the west side of the township, touched off a discussion in Markham Twp. council concerning various other licensing potentials.

Councillor Mumberson said the matter of granting kennel licenses to everyone who applied, should stop. "Many residents don't want a dog kennel near their property and already the township has four in this residential area," he said.

While on the subject of kennel licenses, councillor Mumberson took the opportunity of drawing attention to several other properties on the 4th concession which he thought should be cleaned up.

He said that a lot of old cars had been on the property of a service station for years without being moved, and suggested that the owner should apply for a junk yard license. He said that the service station license should not be renewed until the property was inspected and passed as satisfactory.

The councillor also condemned the yard near Heise Hill near Gormley, used for storing old lumber. He said that in his opinion this place should be put in order, as it reduced the value of the homes nearby.

Reeve Clark replied that lumber was being bought and sold and suggested that a dealership in second hand goods would cover the situation.

There was no action in the matter of the kennel license request.

Charges County Jobs Becoming 'Graveyard For Past Wardens'

Reeve Jos. Dales of North Gwillimbury turned the heat on County Council last week when he charged that York County jobs were being lobbied out to past county wardens. He spoke out in strong opposition to the suggestion that former County Warden Marshal McMurchy be made Judge of the Juvenile and Family Court to replace Judge Webster who is soon to retire.

The Attorney General's Department had revealed to county council that Mr. McMurchy's name was being considered for the position.

"I'd hate to see Juvenile Court serve as a graveyard for past county wardens," Reeve Dales commented.

Reeve Dales said he had the greatest respect for Mr. McMurchy as a man, but did not think that his qualifications suited the man who was to sit as County Judge. Mr. McMurchy is presently a county probation officer.

Former Warden Wm. Hodgson of Ming Twp. said he didn't think past wardens were looking for any soft jobs.

County Council has power to recommend a man for the juvenile court post but the final decision is up to the Attorney

General. The matter was laid over for further discussion.

TOWNSHIP OF MARKHAM NOMINATIONS And ELECTIONS

A meeting of the Municipal Electors of the Township of Markham will be held in the

Buttonville Women's Institute Hall

on Friday, November 25

between the hours of 7 and 8 o'clock in the evening for the purpose of nominating candidates for Reeve, Deputy-Reeve, and Councillor for each of the Wards 1, 2 and 3, for the year 1961.

Nominations will also be held at the same time for the election of TWO (2) members for the Board of Trustees, School Area No. 1, Markham Township; and TWO (2) members for the Board of Trustees to serve Markham Township School Area No. 2.

Every nomination shall be in writing, on forms provided, and shall be signed by the Proposer and Secunder, both of whom shall be Municipal Electors and present at the meeting. When a proposed candidate is not present, his nomination paper shall not be valid unless there is attached thereto evidence satisfactory to the Returning Officer that he consents to be so nominated.

Candidates must obtain from the Treasurer a certificate showing that at the time of opening of the Nomination Meeting there are no taxes of a preceding year overdue and unpaid in respect of the land on which they propose to qualify, and no business tax overdue and unpaid for the current year.

If more candidates are nominated for the respective offices hereinbefore mentioned than are required to fill the same, the election will be held on:

between the hours of 10 o'clock a.m. and 8 o'clock p.m. in the polling places designated (see bills setting out Polling Sub-divisions).
