

BASEMENT CAN BE SUMMER BETREAT

Chances are, many home owners who had to "sweat out" the hot weather this summer overlooked a good bet for quick relief -- an air-conditioned basement.

A sunken living room or recreation room is already partly cooled by surrounding earth. It takes a small further investment to air condition it completely.

A concrete block basement should give excellent insulation value, since blocks contain dead air spaces. If the basement is cold and damp, it may indicate faulty construction.

A properly constructed concrete block basement is dry and damp-proof. If water is leaking through, it may indicate faulty below-grade construction outside the wall. This can be corrected in several different ways.
