FOR BETTER HEALTH

MEDITORIAL: Overweight not only increases the risk of disease but also complicates examination and treatment.

The heart of an overweight person is difficult to hear through the stethoscope. Abdominal organs, such as the liver, spleen, kidneys, are harder to find and examine. Tumors inside the abdomen will not be found early and inflammations such as appendicitis are difficult to diagnose. Delay often means rupture and peritonitis. Incorrect blood pressure readings are occasionally found in patients with very fat upper arms.

Care of an obese person is usually difficult, especially when it is necessary to move or carry him. Artificial respiration can be a problem and in some cases, is not too effective.

X-rays of overweight people are often not as clear and thus important shadows can be missed. The need for repeat X-rays for clearer pictures is common. This involves return visits to the X-ray department and unnecessary worry.

Another big problem with obesity is the technical difficulty encountered during surgical operations. The presence of too much fat can hinder the surgeon. The possibility of complications is greatly increased and anesthesia is more difficult to give.

A vein puncture (insertion of a needle into the vein) is common and occasionally this procedure is life-saving (blood transfusions, adrenalin injections). Obesity tends to hide veins so that drawing blood or injecting medicines into the blood stream can be almost impossible.

Remember—overweight is often more of a problem for the persons around you.

Markham Twp. Nominations

No. 1 was being serviced by both water and sanitary sewers. It was a major development when Markham was able to complete an agreement with Metro for use of the Metro Trunk sewer.

As regards the Police force he considered the Township to be in good hands with ample protection.

Road Program

Councillor Lawson Mumberson spoke on the road program of which he was chairman. The cost of maintenance last winter was very high, which limited the funds available for this summer. However, he drew attention to the fact that Markham Twp. had kept the roads open and serviced by its own equipment and had not hired any outside help.

The cost of dust layer this year was down from 1959, partly on account of the permanent road mileage being increased. Carville Rd. and Kirk Rd. had cost more than the estimate. Carville proving a difficult area. The County had taken over 7½ miles of the Twp. road system but other roads were being added so the mileage continued to increase.

He drew attention that in 1952 the mill rate for roads was 11 and no hard top was laid, but it later was cut to 9½ and a program of permanent roads adopted. This year the rate would again be 11 mills.

Councillor Stanley B. Watson stated the Twp. had a pension Plan which led to obtaining better staff.

He spoke of the program to improve a number of cemeteries that were now in use. He invited those present to view the work completed.

Mr. C. Alvin Gamble criticized the Council for not being sufficiently aggressive against the new railroad. He stated that he would stand for Council in Ward 2.

Mr. Allen Sumner, Trustee of Thornhill stated he was quite conversant with Twp. affairs and suggested Markham would be in a better position, with a resident Engineer.

He said fire protection was not ample with the Richmond Hill Brigade three miles distant and more protection was required in the more densely populated areas.

He suggested the playground area was not ample and the Twp. should acquire more land. He stated he would be in the field in Ward 1 and asked for support.

G.P. Howe gave a resume of his past services in the Air Force and the Transport Dept. He is now retired. He considered if elected he would give ample time to the duties of Council and he could see many things which required attention in Thornhill. He said he would stand in Ward 1.

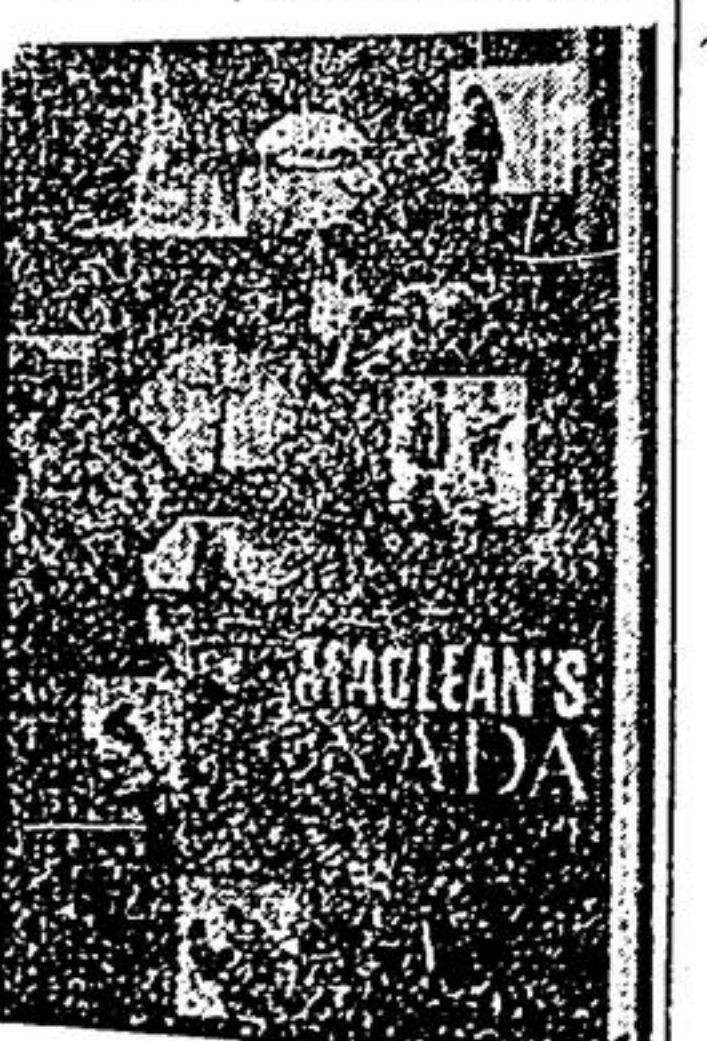
Chas. H. Hooper stated he would change his method of address in that he would not be so critical of the past Council. He gave a resume of his long experience in Council and as Reeve and Warden. He thought men of experience were needed in present times.

The new proposed road required close supervision on the part of the Twp. Council in order to protect the present Twp. roads.

He favored an adequate Police Force but considered the present expenditure could be decreased. He stated he would stand in Ward 2.

Archie Campbell stated he would stand for election in Ward 3 and gave as one of his reasons "gross mishandling of the railroad situation permitting a number of level crossings".
