



MEDITORIAL: In recent years we have heard the term "virus" used to explain more and more illnesses. This is because in the last 25 years a large number of new viruses responsible for human illnesses have been revealed.

Back in 1920 only a dozen or so viruses were known to exist. Now approximately 35 have been

Viruses are extremely small germs and their structure is not entirely known. They are much smaller than the bacteria germs (like the streptococcus) and in no way resemble them. They are so small that many have never been seen even by the most powerful microscope.

Viruses cause a number of illnesses, among them the common cold, warts, fever blisters, poliomyelitis, shingles, liver infections, children's diseases (mumps, chickenpox, measles). Most virus diseases are followed by a permanent immunity. Exceptions are the common cold and fever blis-

The commonly used antibiotics (sulfa, penicillin, tetracycline, etc.) have no effect on virus diseases and should not be used in their treatment unless there is also a bacterial infection.

Through the years of research, Dr. Salk produced an effective vaccine to prevent poliomyelitis and vaccines are now under study to prevent other virus diseases. Perhaps in the future vaccines to prevent all these diseases will be discovered.


