Edgar James Wins Pickering Twp. Deputy-Reeveship by 52 Votes Approve 2 Year Term - Library How They Voted in Pickering Township

Issue Defeated.

Mr. Edgar James, councillor in Ward 2 for the past four years, is the new Deputy-Reeve in the Township of Pickering for the 1961 term. He defeated his closest opponent. Mrs. Jean L. McPherson by a scant 52 votes. Mr. James' total was 1.199. Mrs. McPherson had 1.147. A third candidate, Wm. Fairgrieve, trailed the field with 682. All former councillors were returned. Harry Boyes defeated Miss Violet Swan 306 to 154 in Ward 3. Ross Deakin was given strong support in Ward 4 and swept the post over his rival, John Campbell by a 270 vote majority. Councillor Deakin polled 509. Mr. Campbell counted 239. A much closer contest was waged between councillor Clifford Laycox in Ward 5 and Mr. Reginald Bozek, Mr. Laycox was the ultimate winner by a majority of 148 votes. Reeve Sherman Scott and councillors Harvey Spang and Milton Mowbray had earlier received acclamations, Position in Doubt

The office of Deputy-Reeve was in doubt until the results of the final polls had been revealed. The lead changed hands on a number of occasions. Mr. James received strong support in the urban area of West Rouge where he more than doubled the ballot return of his opponent, Mrs. McPherson. In the three West Rouge polls he received 282 votes. Mrs. McPherson collected only 113. With the exception of this particular area, there was no cut and dried pattern of support for either candidate. Mrs. McPherson gained a majority in Claremon! Atha and Whitevale. Mr. James was ahead at Green River. Mt. Zion, Kinsale, Brougham and Audley. He was well supported at his home poll at the Brock Road. Mrs. McPherson, on the other hand came on strongly in many southern centres including Glengrove, Fairport and Rosebank. Any advantage garnered at these points failed to over-balance the scales that swung heavily in Mr. James' favour in the West Rouge. At the majority of other polls throughout the numicipality the vote was quite evenly divided.

Total Sweep Councillor Harry Boyes swept each of the five polls in Ward 3. It was his first complete endorsation, since he filled the position early in 1960 by appointment through the resignation of Mr. Harry Ashton. His opponent was a former councillor, Miss Violet Swan. From the first returns, it was obvious that Mr. Boyes had little cause for concern. It was conceded that Miss Swan, a resident of Rosebank, was not too well known in the Ward 3 area,

Double Support One of the most amazing victories was established by Ward 4 councillor, Ross Deakin. In seven polls, he collected a total of 509 votes, more than double the return gained by his opponent. Mr. John Campbell. In only one constituency did Mr. Campbell gain an edge on the incumbent candidate. At the Glengrove School, councillor Deakin swept the poll by 113 to 10. In spite of the setback, Mr. Campbell suggested that he would again return to the political scene.

Close Contest The three West Rouge polls that threw their ballot support behind councillor Edgar James, also endorsed incumbent candidate. Clifford Laycox. He defeated Mr. Reginald Bozek 583 to 435 in a close contest. Mr. Bozek moved out front in the early returns from the constituencies of Altona Road and Rosebank. The majority at these polls melted away under Mr. Laycox' sweep in West Rouge.

Questions Split One question on the ballot was approved while another was rejected. The electorate endorsed the two-year council term by an affirmative vote of 1,725 to 1,238. The township library was turned down by 1,354 to 1,016.


