

## Polly Minton To Coach All-star Team

Polly Minton, well-known Stouffville hockey player a few seasons back and now an O.H.A. official, has agreed to coach an all-star Stouffville Community League entry against the Unionville "Jets" on Friday night, Jan. 20th. The proceeds from the game will be divided between a local players' benefit fund and the Stouffville Minor Hockey Association. Minton was the unanimous choice of the Community League representatives at a special meeting on Sunday afternoon.

Fifteen players will be selected for an all-star lineup, including two goaltenders. Sweaters have been offered by both Greenwood-Mt. Zion and Stouffville. All players' names must be submitted to the League Chairman by Jan. 6th. The Unionville roster will be little changed from the present lineup. A pre-game practice will be arranged for the local club by the Arena Manager, W. T. Renne.

Lucky draw tickets will go on sale shortly. The purchase of one ticket will also admit the bearer to the game. The regular admission price will be 50c, with children under 12 admitted free. Refreshments for both clubs will be provided by the Minor Hockey Association after the game.

Brian Fletcher was the main spark plug in the Whitby attack. He fired two goals and assisted on two others. Ron Moore potted a pair and Doug McLean netted a single. Larry McMullen was the lone marksman for Stouffville.

Marvin Betz continued his fine play between the pipes for the Stouffville club. He was especially keen in the first and second periods. The shooting of some Stouffville forwards was erratic.

Travis Sugden, a new recruit added this season to the local entry, brought roars of approval from partisan Stouffville fans as he led numerous cyclonic rushes down the ice. He formed a potent defensive duo with Rick Wedseltoft. Bob Lehman and Keith McDowell formed another rearguard pair. Three lines comprised Barry McLean, Wayne Pennanen and Allan Boyd; Lynn McMullen, Grant Foreman and Roger Stover; Dave Bate, Peter Stover and Grant Pascoe.

## Player Draws Suspension

Wayne Redshaw, currently the point-scoring leader in the Stouffville Community Hockey League, was given a one-game suspension at a meeting of team representatives on Sunday afternoon. The Claremont forward was banished from Friday's game by referee Glenn Byer when he objected strenuously to a minor penalty called by the official.

## Roger Stover Sparks Juveniles To 8-2 Win

Roger Stover, deprived of a full season of hockey action last winter, due to the withdrawal of the Juvenile entry, appears headed towards one of his best years. Posted on a left wing position with line mates, Lynn McMullen and Grant Foreman, the local athlete rifled three pucks into the net at Lindsay on Friday. Stouffville humbled the homestays 8-2 in their initial game of the schedule.

Stover has been shifted up on the juvenile front line although he had previously performed as a rearguard. The switch from defence to offence has not had any ill effects on his playing ability. In addition to his hard, trick effort, five other players dented the Lindsay twine. Single goals came from the sticks of Rick Wedseltoft, Grant Foreman, Dave Bate, Allan Boyd and Barry McLean. Marvin Betz, a local netminder who has worked under the shadow of ace puck-stopper, Glenn Jackson, has been given the opportunity to prove his worth through the absence of the agile Jackson. On Friday night he turned in a brilliant performance and won the praise of his mates and the team management. Only two pucks slipped past his defences.

## Jackson Makes Debut In "Jet" Goal

Stouffville's Glenn Jackson proved to himself, his players and the fans that he has earned the right to perform in O.H.A. Junior "B" company when he replaced Unionville's Rick Charon in the nets at Newmarket on Tuesday night. He made his official debut a winning one as the "Jets" chalked up a 9-6 victory over the "Smoke Rings".

In a previous meeting between the two clubs on Unionville ice, the homestays were forced to settle for a 4-4 draw.

Jackson's efforts were aided by a goal-hungry "Jet" squad who rapped nine pucks into the Newmarket twine. Their last effort came in the final minute of the game when John Saunders drilled the disk into the empty cage. Their goaltender, Pat Dineen was sitting on the bench in favour of a sixth at-tacker. Saunders, with a pair of tallies, was the only Unionville player to score more than one goal. Single markers came from the sticks of Dick Underwood, Jerry Rowarth, Bill Johnston, Barry Watson, Walter McLean, Glenn Boon and Ross Colburn. Ted Murrell, John McKnight, Bill McKenzie, John Canavan, John McMillan and John Hall were the Newmarket marksmen.

Netminder Jackson made some fine stops as his team skated to their eighth straight game without a loss. They have 7 victories and one tie. First-string puck-stopper, Charron has been sidelined with the shingles. Jackson may see action again on Saturday night when the Jets journey to Brampton. They play host to St. Mike's on Tuesday, Dec. 13th in a feature tilt.

## Borean Nets Winner For Markham Team

Lindo Borean, an unorthodox player with a magic-like shot has upset many a tightly contested hockey game since he was introduced to the Stouffville Community League. Last season he wielded a potent stick for the Stouffville "Merchants". This year, he has lined up with Markham. On Friday night, the Greenwood-Mt. Zion "Combiners" were reminded of his deadly accuracy when he slipped the puck into the rivals' cage with only two seconds to go in the game. The tally, at 19:58, broke up a thrilling 5-5 tie and gave Markham the two-point victory.

The loss was even more heart-breaking for the Greenwood-Mt. Zion men since they were forced to come from behind and notch their fifth goal with netminder, Jerry Brett on the bench and six forwards inside the Markham blueline.
