net, she said, only dropped his head.

Pretty Cool
"She was pretty cool in later visits," said Mrs. Tindall. "There was quite a marked change. In 1954, she said, a doctor told her that Mrs. Nighswander had a thrombosis and would be unbalanced.

In cross examination, Mrs. Tindall said that she never saw the will that was made in 1942. She only knew what her mother had told her.

Under cross-examination by T. M. Moore, counsel for Bennett, Mrs. Tindall denied that DDT had been sprayed on the cabbage in her garden, from which the sauerkraut was made. She said she sprinkled the plants with salt to keep insects away.

Her sister, Mrs. Elson, also told the court of her mother telling of making a will in 1942 following instructions from her father to divide the estate among the three daughters.

She, too, said that her mother never seemed as close to her daughters after the sauerkraut incident. She recalled one occasion in later years when her mother met her at the door and suggested that she should slap her face.

Left Home
Mrs. Elson said that she walked away from the home and later Bennett caught up to her in a truck and asked her to return. She did not, she said, and finally, when she was at a neighbor's home, her mother arrived with Bennett and coaxed her to return to the home. She said that she did not discuss with her mother the reason for the threatened slap.

She told the court that Bennett came to the farm before her father's death and worked

the farm for two-thirds of the crop.

Mrs. Nighswander's granddaughter, Mrs. Eva M. Wilson, said that she often visited her grandmother. She recalled hearing her mention the will made at Button's office but had been told that it was torn up and put in the waste paper basket.

Grandmother ill
She also recalled the sauerkraut incident. She said that the food made her sick, too, but her grandmother didn't say what had made her ill.

"I don't think she knew," she said.

Charles Bennett, 69, told the court that he had come to the Nighswander farm in the autumn of 1941, after being invited by both Mr. and Mrs. Nighswander. He told of the share-crop agreement.

He told the court that he was unaware that he was to receive the farm until the will was read following her death. He valued the farm at \$10,000 and added that there was a mortgage of \$900 against it.

"She was a nice old lady," he said, "and easy to get along with." She was partially crippled, he said, and since 1947, he had fixed her hair each day. He said that in later years he had done the cooking, washed the dishes, scrubbed the floors and even the laundry.

He said that he could not remember the slapping incident that Mrs. Elson spoke of, but he did remember the sauerkraut. He said that it had been served on Christmas Day and he had taken ill in the afternoon.

The roads in the area were blocked with snow, he said, and he did not get out to see a doctor until two days had passed. He said he consulted two doctors and was told that he was "full of poison."

THE CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF STOUFFVILLE BY-LAW NUMBER 60-13

Being a By-Law to amend By-Law number 864 as amended by by-law number 868.

BE IT ENACTED by the Council of the Village of Stouffville that By-Law number 864 as amended by By-Law number 868 of the Village of Stouffville be and the same is hereby further amended as follows:

- By striking out from the said By-Law 868 Schedule "A" attached thereto and by substituting thereof Schedule "A" attached hereto.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of by-law number 864 as amended the minimum frontage for a one family dwelling on lots 39 and 40 according to registered plan number 70 shall be 50 feet.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of by-law number 864 as amended the minimum frontage for a one family dwelling on Block A, registered plan 401 shall be 55 feet.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of by-law 864 as amended the minimum frontage for a one family dwelling on the Northernly 5 feet of lot 8 and the Southernly 47 feet of lot 7 according to registered plan number 3263 shall be 52 feet.

This By-Law shall come into effect on the day in which it is passed by Council subject to the approval of The Ontario Municipal Board.
