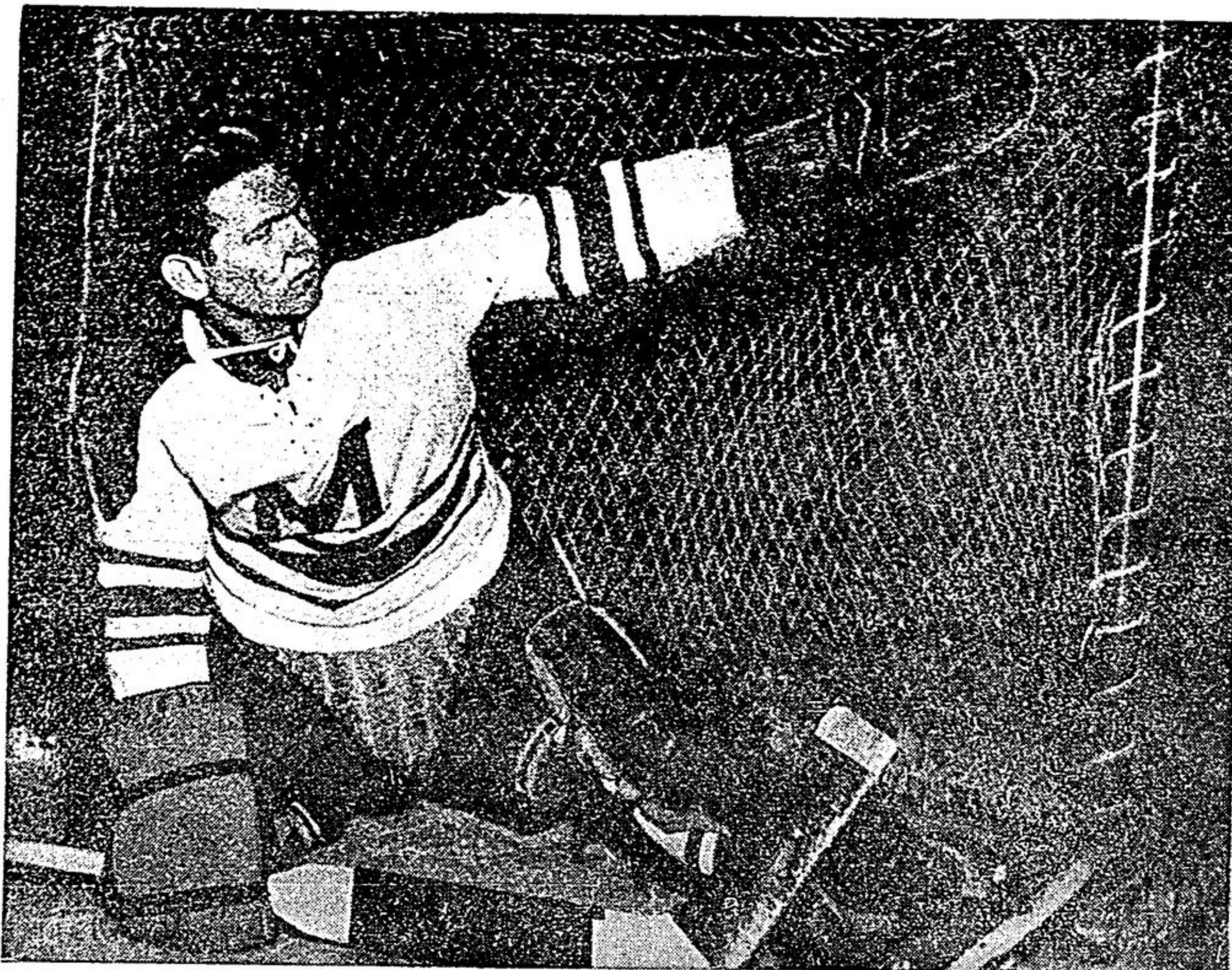


Fifteen All-Star Players Selected For Exhibition Game Fri. Jan. 20

"Jet" Hockey Wizardry Baffles Weston "Dukes"

For two complete periods the Unionville "Jets" zig-zagged through the porous defences of the Weston "Dukes" to grab a 6-1 lead and coast to a one-sided 7-2 victory in a Metro Jr. "B" game in the Unionville Arena on Tuesday night. The visitors showed some spark of life in the final frame but they could not match the determined drive of the "Jets" who swarmed up and down the ice like a bunch of bees.

Weston were outplayed in every department. The Unionville speedsters sifted over the blue-line almost at will, during the game's first forty minutes, and left the rearguards spinning.

The "Dukes" advantage in size and weight wilted under the puck-passing ability of the "Jets". Four Unionville goals were scored with Weston players in the cooler. In this department, they showed their only edge.

Garry Milroy was a Unionville standout. Although he counted only one of their seven tallies, he turned in a spectacular two-way performance. He drilled one drive off the post before he finally cashed in with his team's seventh and final goal. Bill Johnston patrolled the left wing position at full throttle all night and picked up two points with a goal and an assist. Jerry Row-

arth was the club's only two-goal marksman. Other single tallies came from the sticks of Ross Colburn, John Brigdon and Glenn Boone.

Before the largest crowd of the season, Unionville vaulted into a 4-0 lead in the first period. They outscored their visitors 2-1 in the second session and divided a pair of goals in the final frame. Rick Charron in the "Jet" cage was not over-worked except for a brief stint in the last period when he pulled off some brilliant stops. Bob Perani in the Weston net looked good on drives by Walter McLean and John Brigdon. He was given feeble support by his defence.

Greenwood Runs Wild in 8-Goal Scoring Spree

The Greenwood-Mount Zion "Combines" broke out in a free-skating scoring spree on Friday night and buried Claremont under an 8-goal assault. It was the best game of the evening. The picture passing plays completed by the winners was one of the finest front-line efforts staged in Community League competition this season.

Matt Kinnari was the main spark plug in the Greenwood offensive. He fired four goals and picked up one assist. Grant Jones was finally awarded for his season-long efforts. He counted one goal and assisted on two others. Murray Jones, Pete Byberg and Howard Malcolm were the other Greenwood marksmen.

Although considerably smaller than their all-star opponents, they possess an abundance of puck-juggling skill and shooting ability. Goaltender, Glenn Jackson will likely get the nod for the puck-stopping chores. Their first-string netminder, Rick Charron will be available and may be used in one of the three periods. A complete line-up of the Unionville club will be published in next week's issue.

The proceeds from the game will be divided between the Stouffville Minor Hockey Association and the Community League's Injured Players' Benefit Fund. An attendance of close to 1,000 people is expected. Lucky draw admission tickets are currently on sale. Prizes will be given away during the intermission periods. Players of both clubs will be guests of the Stouffville Lions Club's sports committee at the conclusion of the contest.

Juveniles Beat Port 6-2 to Finish Schedule

The Stouffville Juveniles completed the regular league schedule in a winning way on Monday night by chalking up a 6-2 victory over a battling Port Perry club in a clean contest. Only five penalties were handed out by officials Polly Minton and Ab Barnes. Four trips to the cooler were made by Port Perry players.

Larry McMullen paced Stouffville's goal-scoring attack with a pair of goals. Single tallies were counted by Barry McLean, Wayne Pennanen, Allan Boyd and Grant Pascoe. Garry Geer and Frank Tobin were marksmen for the visitors.

Albert Leach, the netminder with the Scoug squad handled a pile of rubber throughout the game and his efforts were mainly responsible for the four goal difference between the clubs. The homesters finally found an opening in his armour in the second period and rattled three pucks into the twine in less than three minutes. Allan Boyd turned in his best performance of the season.

The Stouffville "Merchants" chalked up an important Community League victory on Friday night when they upset Markham "Aces" 3-2 in a close contest. Goaltender Jim Johnston vacated the nets in the final minute after Lawrence Gayman had put Markham withy in one goal of the Stouffville rivals at 18:30. The offensive strategy failed to pay off.

The Markham club appeared somewhat bewildered at times and failed to show the front line power that was noticeable in some former games. Stouffville outshot them 27-8. The win boosted the "Merchants" into a second place tie with Markham, four points back of the pace-setting Ringwood squad.

Howard Forgie, Neville O'Sullivan and Bert Dickson were the Stouffville marksmen. Bob Graham and Lawrence Gayman fired single tallies for Markham. Pete Lacey made the lone advance up the point-scoring ladder among the top "big three", including Wayne Redshaw of Claremont and Al Tidbury of the "Aces". Lacey collected an assist to raise his point total to 21.

If this rating is followed by local Convener, Gord Hawes, Stouffville's pee wee, bantam, midjet and juvenile will be placed in "B" for the forthcoming playoffs. As yet, an official ruling has not been submitted to Head Coach, Bob Bangay.
